Annual retreat pinpoints many city priorities

At the beginning of each year, Cottonwood Heights city officials hold an annual retreat to discuss issues and provide direction on projects, initiatives and budget priorities for the upcoming year. The council retreat, which

is a public meeting, was held on Jan. 25. The retreat also involved city department heads, whose expertise, experience and knowledge prompted important ideas for the city council to consider. The following is a summary of some of the issues and efforts that will occur throughout this year:

Y2 Analytics survey: We've partnered with local market research and data analytics company Y2 Analytics to administer a citywide scientific survey. The survey will include a random selection

of thousands of residents who may participate by providing feedback on city services and future initiatives. Y2 Analytics will administer the survey this spring and present the results to the city council in the early summer months. We look forward to getting valuable resident feedback soon.

City fiberoptic options: We know reliable internet is important and a concern for many residents. We will be inviting multiple entities to discuss possible fiberoptic options for Cottonwood Heights in upcoming months.

Grants: The city council will continue to pursue Tourism, Recreation, Cultural and Convention (TRCC), Zoo, Arts and Parks (ZAP) and Wasatch Front Regional Council grants to fund various city priorities, including safe walking routes, outdoor recreation, open space, land conservation and corridor preservation. We are also focused on understanding and securing federal infrastructure funding opportunities for local governments.

Road and infrastructure improvements: We have budgeted for many road improvements throughout the city as part of our five-year plan. We will continue efforts to maintain and rebuild our roads. Watch for slurry seal and chip seal projects beginning this spring in several areas of our community.

Public works building: The city council will be evaluating the possibility of bonding for a new public works building. This project is critical to provide adequate storage and maintenance facilities to protect valuable equipment that is currently on an uncovered lot. It will also provide better staff facilities and salt and snowplow storage to allow for a more expedited dispatch during snowstorms.

Waterway replacement: Many of the city's waterways need to be repaired or replaced. Thanks to the stormwater fund approved by the mayor and city council in summer 2021, we are now collecting funds

to dedicate to this infrastructure.

Cybersecurity investments: With the increasing threat of cyberattacks, the city will consider implementing enhanced measures to protect our IT systems and provider greater city function security.

Traffic and transportation initiatives: Another priority we identified was evaluating options to reduce speed and mitigate vehicular accidents. Discussion has occurred and will continue to occur to prompt a speed reduction on the state of Utahcontrolled Wasatch Boulevard. We will also advocate for enhancing community transportation alternatives.

Public safety advisory committee: The city council will discuss the possibility of creating a public safety advisory committee to enhance resident involvement input in matters pertaining to safety issues in our community.

General Plan: We have been working on an update to the city's General Plan, the document

that guides the city's growth and determines the desired ways in which to grow. Project consultants are holding a General Plan open house on March 8 at City Hall, and we encourage you to attend and provide your feedback.

Legislative policy options: City staff will be preparing a number of legislative policy options for the city council to consider, including changes to city code sections on highways, sidewalks and public places, permit parking, business licensing, sensitive lands and landscaping. The city council may also consider resolutions on climate change and emphasizing the need for reduced speeds on Wasatch Boulevard.

There are many other issues we'll consider this year, and I greatly appreciate our mayor and city council's service, ideas and efforts. I'm grateful for this retreat each year and am excited to see what we can accomplish in 2022.

Cottonwood Heights Citizens Police Academy offers hands-on experience

The Cottonwood Heights Citizens Police Academy was created to build a bond of mutual trust and respect between the police department and the community by reducing misconceptions and perceived notions

about police work.

During the 10-week program, residents participate in classroom presentations and lectures and receive hands-on experience to better understand day-to-day police department operations. In turn, residents also provide direct feedback for department employees. This twoway communication between police officers and the community furthers efforts to improve our residents' and business communities' quality of life.

Class topics include:

- Lethal force/firearm simulator: Participants receive an introduction to the rules governing an officer's use of force, including an overview of weapons systems and how officers use them. Class members also participate in simulated real-life situations where they have to decide if or when to deploy force.
- Valley Emergency Communications

Center (VECC) tour: Participants will tour the VECC, which provides police and fire dispatch services for the city.

- Criminal investigation and evidence collection: This segment introduces participants to crime investigation.
- Gangs and narcotics: Gang and narcotics enforcement investigators will provide insights on local investigations.
- Domestic violence and K-9s: Investigators and the department's victim advocate will provide an overview of domestic violence investigations. Participants will have the opportunity to meet the department's K-9 officers and their handlers.
- **Traffic enforcement:** This segment introduces participants to tactics police officers use to enforce traffic laws and investigate violations. Officers will also provide an overview of their roles in the department.
- Less-lethal force and SWAT teams: In this class, participants meet the department's SWAT team and learn more about their equipment. They also learn more about less-lethal weapons available to officers.

Citizens Police Academy begins March 23 at City Hall (2277 E. Bengal Blvd.) Participants meet



once a week from 6 to 8 p.m. in the Community Room or at other venues, including VECC, for 10 weeks. At the May 25 graduation, class members will receive a certificate of completion and are welcome to attend the reception that follows.

Citizens Police Academy participants must be at least 18 years old and of good community standing and live or work in Cottonwood Heights. They must also pass a background investigation.

Some Utah Department of Health-sponsored COVID-19 testing sites now closed

With demand at COVID-19 testing sites declining across the state, and as the Utah Department of Health (UDOH) prepares to transition to a more long-term, sustainable response to the pandemic, the UDOH announced closed several COVID-19 testing locations across the state and in Salt Lake County, including:

- University of Utah tailgate lot
- Maverik Center
- Bluffdale City Park

These closures are the first of several that will occur over the next month as the UDOH transitions COVID-19 testing away from mass community sites to a model where most testing is conducted by health care providers, private testing providers, or home testing.


"We've closely monitored testing demand throughout the pandemic, and especially over the past several weeks. Many locations that used to test thousands of people a day are now testing fewer than 100," says Nate Checketts, executive director of the Utah Department of Health. "We have worked to ensure other testing options are available in the vicinity of each site we are closing. Additionally, contracts with testing partners will remain in place, which provides us with the ability to re-open sites if the situation warrants."

If you need a COVID-19 test:

Visit coronavirus.utah.gov to find a testing

location near you, including doctors' offices and other healthcare facilities

- Buy at-home test kits at local pharmacies or online. Most private health insurance covers at-home test kits.
- Order four free test kits for your household at covidtests.gov. These kits usually ship within 7 to 12 days.



Weekly green waste collection program resumes March 16

Wasatch Front Waste and Recycling District's weekly green waste collection program will resume Wednesday, March 16, for Cottonwood Heights residents (currently 1,315 out of the 9,478 district-wide subscribers). You can sign up and help divert green waste from the landfill to be processed into mulch at the Salt Lake Valley and Trans-Jordan landfills. This program costs \$126 annually with a one-time \$60 start-up fee. An extra black garbage can is \$204 annually, which makes the green waste collection program less expensive.

Maintain landscaping and trees to help Wasatch Front Waste truck drivers

Spring is a great time to trim your trees. As a reminder, municipal ordinance requires trees and landscaping hanging over the street be trimmed to a minimum of 13.5 feet above the pavement.

Following these guidelines will help Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District trucks navigate through your neighborhood and empty your cans without potential damage to your trees, other property and the trucks.


