Online interviews fielded November 9-30, 2019  
Margin of error +- 2.89

For this survey 1,069 Cottonwood Heights residents were sampled from the state's file of active registered voters in Cottonwood Heights (see sampling details below). Sampling error is only one possible source of error in survey research. Results can also be affected by measurement error (e.g. question wording and question order), coverage error (e.g. counting as "likely voters" survey respondents who will not vote), and non-response error (e.g. the people who responded to the survey are systematically different from people who refused or were not reachable).

Residents were sampled to participate in the survey and invited via email as well as postal mail invitation to ensure maximum coverage. Data have been weighted to ensure that the demographics of survey respondents are representative of the registered voting population of Cottonwood Heights, particularly in regards to age and gender.

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1) Thanks for allowing this forum in the survey for additional feedback. Snow on the sidewalks- year after year main, visible sidewalks that are along major roads aren't often shoveled. We're told to call in and report any concerns, but if Code Enforcement took a drive east and west on 7200 S or Bengal Blvd, they'd see the issue first-hand. REDACTED. I think the city needs to be aware and care about these little things. It's not just the time after a storm, but days and weeks later. Again, these aren't side-street sidewalks, but ones out in the open that any proactive enforcement officer could see (A little help? That would be awesome.) Maybe a bit of education before the snow flies would be helpful. 2) Code/property enforcement. There are a handful of properties up and down REDACTED that are pretty run down. They are highly visible and have yard issues beyond code allowances (really tall weeds, etc). Would be great if Code Enforcement could check into those without waiting for a neighbor to call. 3) I know people generally complain about the police, but I like having the officers out and about and even parking in and around my neighborhood. I've never had reason to call the police, but I feel like we'd get a good response time. I see enough officers that I feel safe. I know others have felt they're heavy-handed, but I don't have any first-hand experience with that.

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1) I have had a couple of instances when I had a chance say hello to one our police officers and was surprised that I did not get a response. 2) When the city was incorporated, one of the main "selling" points to the residents was that we were going to save \$13M per year, I believe, those dollars were never saved and spent for police vehicles (cars, trucks, unmarked trucks, etc.), a new office building and maybe more.

---

1. I think mother-in-law apartments should be legal for renting, it's not going to destroy the city and most people that have them already do rent them out. It seems like a waste of city resources to have to manage complaints...I was in your office and that was the only thing that was talked about by the workers in the office. I listened to them talk about AirBNB and so forth for an hour or so.

2. The Rec Center should provide resident rates to anyone with an address in Cottonwood Heights, regardless if it's officially Cottonwood Heights or part of the outliers. I am a resident of Cottonwood Heights for sure now that I got this letter and had to get a building permit from Cottonwood Heights.

3. We need a downtown district, we have the ski resorts and nice neighborhoods but we don't have a place to enjoy locally. We have to go to Holladay or Midway. I think this would bring in a lot of money and people.

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Otherwise, I love Cottonwood Heights and appreciate everything the city offers. It's a great place with great people and neighborhoods.

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43 years in Cottonwood Heights and my family and I would live nowhere else!

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A few items of concern.

Fluoride in the water - We used to have amazing water, Lived here 55 years.

Now it is polluted with fluoride, forced to drink chemicals. Scientific proof it causes fluorosis and breakdown of the body. Too bad some people in leadership ignore the research and force it on everyone.

Also, some of the streets need to be re-surfaced to change the grade allowing snow plows to do their job in the winter and not destroying residents bumpers all year. Cory Hill Circle is a disaster.

Also, ridiculous how new building of homes on a few vacant lots in a well established neighborhood means creating a storm water system of it's own that will most likely never be used. Like a punch in the gut to the developer and the new home owners. OVER KILL! The city can make their money in much better ways. Lighten up.

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About time we got a glass recycling dumpster.

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Absolutely love the rec center. It's a great resource. Please consider adding more recumbent bikes for us older folks. Thank you all for the services you provide in this great community!

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After cleaning the snow from my driveway on snow days the plow truck drivers then come by and leave a berm of snow across my and my



neighbor's driveways. I would suggest that you send someone to look at the snow plow trucks used by the city of Elko, NV. Their plows have a simple gate on the end of the plow which is dropped as they go past a driveway preventing any snow being left in front of the driveway.

After some rough years, snow removal seems to be on the right track. Grateful for the "new" fire station. Recycling is problematic. I am not convinced the city does enough to recycle plastic containers (properly) and the "glass drop" is a helpful resource, but limited to one location? I appreciate the leaf bags and drop locations in fall. Why is there no effort to enforce leash laws in parks? (i.e. better signage advising penalties for failure to clean up after your animal...) I love our parks and community events. I have some doubts about the deployment of our police assets...in that we seem to have such available staffing that the simplest of calls produces 3-4 units responding.

Already stated how I feel about building approval. Snow removal is extremely slow. We need a glass recycling drop off

Although I live in Cottonwood Heights, I am \*just\* outside the boundaries of the CHRC. I sure wish we could have the boundaries adjusted so EVERYONE who has a Cottonwood Heights address can get a membership to the rec center.

Also, with the construction at Ft Union and Highland Drive, it's great to have an additional left turn lane, but I wish the other lanes hadn't been sacrificed (ex. Highland Drive dropping from 3 to 2 Northbound lanes. And the right turn lane from heading west on Ft Union to north on Highland Drive seems shorter??)

Although recycling seems to be handled by Salt Lake County services contracted out. Recycling is way behind the times. It seems less and less is able to be recycled, and can be very costly too. Our state, county, city all need better recycling services. This seems to be a tough/expensive endeavor.

Although the rec center was recently remodeled to add some equipment, the exercise rooms are still too small to accommodate the number of people you use them. I opted this year to switch to a private gym because I became so frustrated with the crowds at the rec center, at least in the exercise and weight rooms.

Always thought the Rec Center was just a private business the city contracted with (and incorporated so they could do so), rather than being a publicly operated facility with public employees like the county rec centers.

An area near my home had the zoning changed from family to high density without the public opinion. I believe it should have been voted on or notified the surrounding home owners for consideration. Also we are struggling to get snow removal and pot holes filled on small streets and dead end roads. It turns into an icy mess quickly.

Animal Control Ordinance Enforcement is out of control when they have nothing better to do than cite cat owners for cats being outside. A lot of cat owners think that the current ordinance requiring such citation is extreme, unfair, and would rather let resident's domestic felines help solve the out of control rat population in the city, by letting them cull the rat population naturally. Might want to think about that and reconsider such aggressive enforcement of such a ridiculous ordinance.

Appreciate and value the quick response time from our Police Dept.

As I said, my major concern with the city is growth and zoning changes, how it is being changed for developers and federal funding and enforcing for nightly rentals and high density housing. We all want to own a nightly rental for the financial benefit, but none of us want to live next to one.

As a citizen I feel like I do not have a voice. I feel that we are falling short on maintenance of our current infrastructure and trying to expand the Master Plan. Our roads, sewer, and water systems need to be updated but plans to allow development are moving forward. I attended the last 4 months of the planning commission meetings for both large developments on Ft. Union. We voiced some concerns about the traffic, narrow roads, sidewalks, sewer and water drains but they only needed to approve or disapprove based on setbacks or other key factors which would fall inline with the Master Plan. It was very discouraging.

Back to the Wasatch between REDACTED: The road rearrangement is awful if you live on that section! Cars travel much faster than posted, it is dangerous for those of us who have to get in and out of our residences, we NEED lighted speed signs. The configuration turning onto REDACTED is strange.

Better patrol by police in high school area.

Better rec center, updated gym and basketball facility.

Building permits are extremely expensive. My contractor said it was the highest he had ever encountered for a home remodel.

CH needs to improve code enforcement of airbnb (illegal) and renters who are loud/don't take care of where they are living and loose dogs

in parks and walking

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CH should do more to incentivise water conservancy, e.g. tax credits for xeriscaping, etc. Our surface streets are ridiculous...take a ride down Parkridge or Rich Way and see for yourselves. Snow clearing seems to have improved since I moved here four years ago....we usually have clear streets by late morning or early afternoon....which isn't great but it's an improvement.

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CHPD has been terrible. Very rude officers. Officer lack professional etiquette. I feel unsafe in Cottonwood Heights - because of the police. I've nearly been hit by CHPD while crossing the street.

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CHRC is collecting taxes from all of CH residents but does not fairly represent all in the community. Focus now seems to be around Pickleball and Figure Skating (Mayors Interests). If the CHRC isn't going to represent all then it should be a private facility that should sink or swim on its own merit.

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CODE ENFORCEMENT. There are two homes on REDACTED that are abandoned and in severe disrepair. The city has refused to address this issue. The mayor has been contacted by the people numerous times and meetings have been attended. The mayor and his council choose to turn their backs on these issues. How can we support our city administration if they do not support us? IF THESE HOMES WERE NEXT DOOR TO THE MAYOR OR ANY CITY OFFICIALS, THERE WOULD BE ACTION TAKEN.

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CODE ENFORCEMENT: There is a home owner located at approximately REDACTED. who has turned their front yard into a parking lot and who has a permanent dumpster in the driveway.

TRAFFIC: Why was Highland Dr. narrowed to two lanes on both sides of Ft. Union Blvd?

SNOW REMOVAL: Is it possible in cul-de-sacs to pile the snow on each side of the circle where there are no driveways? (Usually at 7 o'clock and 5 o'clock)

BILLBOARDS: Is it possible to eliminate the ugly billboard above the little cafe on Bengal Blvd. and 27th East?

ROAD REPAIRS: Is it possible to repair Creek Road on the hill west of the L.D.S. Church at the entrance to the Ivory Homes subdivision?

SPEED BUMPS: Is it possible to reduce the size of the 4 speed bumps on Danish Road, keeping in mind that Danish Road has a 25 mph speed limit, not 10 mph.

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Can we please have reflective striping/reflectors for snow and rain? Other states seem to have no problem with this. Dog parks would be nice also. Almost every single house on my street (country ave) has a dog (9 of 13 homes?) In general though, I think the city has done a nice job improving CH, and I am very happy living here.

Cinnabar Lane is and has been in terrible condition for the past several years. The quick crack patch done last month was a useless waste of taxpayers dollars, as they left as many cracks as they patched. It is falling apart and in desperate need of resurfacing. No supervisors live on this street so it gets no attention.

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City Council should go overboard to be more transparent. It will stave off the odd conspiracy theories that crop up.

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City Lights- Too bright in our cul-de-sac. Even blackout curtains and blinds don't prevent lights from entering.

Thanks for offering glass recycling

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City Parks and Recreation does nothing for dog owners, although a dog park has been requested by residents for YEARS. Property taxes are being increased with no visible benefit to homeowners especially dog owners. There is NO recycling for yard waste or glass included in regular fees; it is terrible for the environment to put these things into a landfill. Yard waste and glass should be included in our recycling program at NO EXTRA COST to residents. Snow removal has been a disaster in recent years because the City was trying to save money endangering motorists in the process.

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City code enforcement, engineering and the city planner are difficult to work with and sometimes have an agenda that hurts growth as well creating a negative image of the city. This has been emphasized by numerous Engineers and contractors trying to work with our city.

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City officials expressed what I can't do with my lot.. Rather than what I could do.. fire hydrates are all out of the "new code" therefore if you want to sub-divide and make room for future residents, per the city officials, you have to install a fire hydrant closer to your home.. Update your own fire hydrant system city council..

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City refused to acknowledge any responsibility for their lack of upkeep on the storm drains in my neighborhood, even though they have been aware of the problem for years now. The paving on the street is in poor repair, and the city has failed to fix the curb damage

resulting from a leaking water valve on my property

City using contract code inspectors. inspectors should work for city. bad idea. need to carry id from city not their business.

REDACTED gets ASAP snow removal

Clear the whole circle not just the middle of the steer don't block driveways with snows

Closing city streets for running and bicycling events is annoying. The idea of a roundabout by the high school is ridiculous.

Code enforcement is minimal, junk cars, weed filled yards, endlessly barking dogs, and on and on.

The animal enforcement officer has deferred his duties to the Police, who are not "dog catchers."

It is an embarrassment when visitors come and hear the endlessly barking dogs, then explaining how the city is indifferent to the issue.

Code enforcement needs to be a real thing not something we pay for and never see improvements. Pretty sad to walk through neighborhoods of dilapidated houses and yards. Embarrassing to have people see this in our area.

Code enforcement officers need to quit harassing the elderly that still live in houses in the community

Code enforcement only seems to happen when people complain LOUDLY, instead of being proactive in helping our community keep up what should be happening; ie: sidewalks clear, junk vehicles not licensed, park strip and yard clean up and maintained, multiple cars parked at house, over sidewalk, etc.

Code enforcement overzealous dog catcher should not enforce codes.

Code enforcement services are pretty responsive when contacted but more needs to be done about homes that are not well kept resulting in lower property values for other homeowners in the area. Several homes have junk cars, boats and trailers parked in front yards and overall are in very poor condition.

Code enforcement. John Lovoto deviated from the animal restrictions code and allowed a neighbor to have 4 dogs. Complaints regarding the barking noise and smell of feces was ignored by code enforcement

Control the speed limit on Banbury Rd with speed bumps like on Danish Rd. Also monitor the stop signs on Banbury Rd

Cottonwood Heights fire department were busy at setting up fireworks in July and let our home burn to the ground. Other stations finally showed up but it was too late by then. The fire report was not accurate and the response times had been altered (several can verify) but we have come out okay and things are doing well for us. Fireworks are great but the trucks need to be available for a fire not all in one station at the fireworks setting up which is what happened.

Cottonwood Heights is a great place to live!

Cottonwood Heights picks and chooses which laws they feel like enforcing. I have a permanent trailer park home in my back yard that is being rented by the home in front of it, neighbors next to them, also in my back yard, who airbnb their home (against Cottonwood Heights code), and rats coming from both that I have to contend with due to the filth and weeds. No one cares. (Ft Union Blvd, South of Dans Grocery.

Cottonwood Heights should evaluate zoning and allow for second structures in single family home lots to allow residents to have options for reducing costs, similar to Salt Lake City, snow removal has gotten worse ("sloppy"), affordable housing, transportation solutions that are realistic

Cottonwood Heights should have never decided to have it's own police department. The county sheriff was sufficient. As a result we have wasted far too much tax money supporting a police department that has little to do.

Cottonwood Heights is terribly dog unfriendly. There are no off leash areas and a study that was done when CH first became a city that indicated off-leash areas were important has been completely ignored.

Short term lease licenses are only available in a few areas yet there are hundreds of unlicensed houses being rented as vacation rentals. One person told me that the city office told them their house could not get licensed, but it would not be enforced unless someone complained (so go ahead and rent it). This is a disservice to those who have licenses for short term rentals as well as to those neighbors in areas that are not zoned for short term leases. More has to be done to resolve this. Either allow every house to be a vacation rental or enforce your current laws. Don't punish those who pay for a short term license and comply with the laws by allowing everyone else to break the law, save license fees, sale tax payments, etc.

Cottonwood needs to stop building new houses and stop businesses, the traffic is getting to busy. It's nice to have a nice quiet city. Stop pushing out the middle income families.

Could code enforcement enforce the Giverney project to have functioning gates? It seems like a dog and pony show... The public and builder went rounds and rounds for 2 years to hammer out a middle ground. Cottonwood Heights signed off, however the reality is the





agreement means nothing without enforcement. For example the gates were to be "installed and functioning prior to certificate of occupancy on any homes". This is an embarrassment to the community and the neighborhoods surrounding the project. Nothing was done, currently the control cords are duct taped to the sidewalks, builder blaming vandals on BMX bikes riding over the cords on sidewalks? We the residents of Cottonwood Height paid for countless meetings with attorneys to hammer out the deal with the builder and now the code enforcement has no authority over the builder.... or was bought off? The PnZ Dept has not come fwd with a stop work order, the builder is winning as the COs' are being handed out from Cottonwood Heights like nothing is out of order. Its a broken system, traffic, dump trucks, cement trucks, cranes all entering the public side of Greenhills, Despain, and Treasure Way. Trash floods our streets as does the storm water from run off... our children are in a constant danger as the labor force uses our city streets to get to work without passing the office, late, speeding, and reckless. Please enforce. Please stop being a mockery/puppet of the builder and enforce agreements.

Disappointed with the planning commission and the city planners in the direction that they are taking the city. They seem to only want to listen to those who are bringing money into the community with a total disregard for the residents who have lived here for decades. We realize that change happens, but we love Cottonwood Heights for its suburban living. If we wanted to live in the urban environment that they think is so wonderful, we would move to those surrounding areas. We love Cottonwood Heights as a great suburban place to raise a family.

Dissatisfied overall with the snow removal services. There have been many years of frustration since CH took over from the county. The out sourcing to a private vendor was a total debacle. Since CH took over from that vendor, there has been some improvement, but still not back to SL County standards. The initial plowing on the residential streets can never be counted on for timely snow removal. Subsequent clean-up does not even come close to clearing what's left. Time to re-contract with SL County for a professional job.

Do really need the 12 large trucks with plows parked on 30th east 360 days a year. The roads were much better maintained by the county

Do we really need our own police department? I think not. Do we really need our own streets department? I think not. Just not happy with the ongoing effort to create services that could be provided on a county basis for a 6 square mile city. Salt Lake County filled with a lot of small, independent "cities" is not an efficient way to run the government for the Salt Lake valley.

Dog barking all hours is not acceptable. Dogs should be kept inside.

Dog parks?

When will

That take place?

Private property falling in bad shape

No intervention?ie..REDACTED

Dogs off leash / poop not picked up in Ferguson canyon - lots of uneven sidewalks - potholes left too long - roads in poor shape - speeding traffic -

Doing a great job! Would love to see an off leash dog park or two!!!

Don't like increasing taxes as a way to balance the budget

Don't know where recycling centers for items not collected by recycling trucks are located

Electrical polls should be under the ground, more sweeping Machines on residential areas, more trees on parks and secondary water for our gardens.

Every interaction I've had with the police force is a complete joke. Someone tried to break into our house and the cops did absolutely nothing despite it being very obvious it came from the neighbors. People speed through the residential streets and there is zero enforcement despite asking for it.

Every year same problem with cars parked on street during snow storms, need to have more enforcement maybe tickets issued. We also have a problem with the The Gear Room, No PARKING, people have to cross Fort Union Blvd, Why would the city let this bussiness open with no parking?

Focus on keeping green space and parks with excellent walking and biking access from Neighborhoods. Stop all high density building until infrastructure is updated. provide lower cost recycling options to keep our city clean.Focus on residents needs over commuters from other adjoining cities, lower speed limits to keep our children and residents safe.

Fort Union Blvd is ugly. I hate the enormous telephone poles. I hate the central "suicide" lane. I fear for my life every time I have to use it. Why are metro spurs serving the east bench never considered in city plans? .



Garbage and Recycling programs don't encourage residents to think about waste management at all. They don't make it easy for people to recycle. There should be an incentive for filling your recycling and limiting your trash. Green Waste recycling should cost less! Annual pick up using bins is a joke! Please look to SLC for helping residents do an annual pick up.

Programs at Rec Center are ok. Fitness programs don't seem up to par as a personal gym. The weight room is a joke. It really should be much bigger and have more equipment. My biggest pet peeve is that there are always high school or Jr. High students using the pool. I pay good money to use the pool and never can find a free lane to swim in. Why doesn't Brighton High School have it's own pool? Why do these students have priority at peak times over paying customers? I have school age children and think it is a benefit to have them be able to use the programs but I don't think the swim teams should practice during the peak morning hours when adults have time before work.

Garbage collection is often at extremely different times - Late afternoon then early morning. WE. have to put our cans out in the circle and we don't like to put it out the night before due to making it hard for cars to get by.

Garbage employees have been sloppy with trash collection. Ours and neighborhood collection containers lay in roads and on sidewalks with garbage strewn on the ground. Isn't the purpose to "collect" not spread garbage?

Garbage pick up has been spotty over the last 60 days. Fall yard waste dumpsters were only in place for a day and we were unaware of when it was going to be here. We were unable to take advantage of the service.

Garbage/recycling excellent; city snow removal excellent/. Thank you.

Generally all very acceptable.

Hate to see recycling changes

Have been asking for our street light to be repaired for 6 mo this have put in service request several times it is still not fixed

Have no complaints

Highland Ave around Ft Union has never been worse. I drive it everyday and for the first time look for alternate routes. The civil engineers responsible, in mine and EVERYBODY I speak to, did a poor job. I speak for myself and others, change it. Especially the North/Southbound directions at the light. The rumors of a rotary at Bengal, and 2300, in my experience with rotaries, will, in my opinion, lead to Brighton High students "severe injury or death."

Highland has some really rough sections with not potholes, but rough build ups around man covers. From 7200 to the University of Utah CU on Highland it's ROUGH DRIVING on the far right, southbound lane. There have been large improvements with that intersection and I appreciate it.

I already did on the previous questions

I am concerned about the large number of dump trucks/snow plows I see that are never being used.

Seems excessive for the small city that we are.

I am concerned that the problems with the round-a-bout will cause the intersection to need a second change because the round-a-bout is not the appropriate solution.

I am disappointed at the priority placed on having a main street in the master plan (Fort Union with parking, bike paths, trax, etc.) I think it is impractical and expensive and can't understand why we would need that.

I am frustrated by two traffic problems:

- 1) The intersection at Fort Union and Highland has not helped the traffic problem and in some ways has made it worse. The elimination of the northbound right lane (until after the intersection) appears to be the problem. Please reexamine your solution.
- 2) Brighton High School students crossing to and from the school in the morning and afternoon completely shutdown traffic. Even when they behave well--which is not always the case--their large numbers create traffic backup that's untenable. Please consider using two (yes, 2) crossing guards until the construction at the school is complete.

I am generally. well-satisfied.

I am happy that HOA's are not a big part of the housing in Cottonwood Heights. And I don't want local government coming down hard on code violations but there are corners and parts of streets that are clearly in violation or should be in violation of landscaping codes (are there any?). It is common to see homes that are not landscaped, that have vehicles parked on dirt lawns (see the rentals on the south side of REDACTED). The rentals on the top side of REDACTED seem to attract mischief.

The annual area clean-up offered by Wasatch Front Waste is a joke. It's as if they are just going through the motions to say they offer it.



For someone with a 8 to 5 job how do I take advantage of the dumpster when it's left on the curb on a weekday and gone early the next morning. Just don't offer it and save some tax payer money. For comparison, Salt Lake and Sandy both have curbside pick up where your tree branches or appliance can be left for a week without the one-day dumpster constraint.

Butler Park especially and the other parks are the best thing about Cottonwood Heights. Don't be tempted to develop or sell off any of that land. The open space with the mountain views is something you cannot get in most cities in America. We sometimes forget how lucky we are to have it.

The races and the Holiday activities are great. Need more restrictions on aerial fireworks. Clean air is more important than personal fireworks.

Noise ordinance enforcement for loud cars and motorcycles is needed.

The improvements made at the intersection of Fort Union and Highland Drive have somehow made rush hour traffic worse. I now have to wait for 3 light changes to get through were it used to be 1. Did they remove a lane? Frustrating. It looks good but I think it just moved the bottle neck further south.

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I am happy that there is a new glass recycling container down by Old Mill now. I used to have to drive to Holladay to deposit my glass recycling.

I would love to see green waste bins as part of the regular waste collection and not a separate extra expense.

I also wish the Cottonwood Heights Rec Center was part of the county program--I've never been a fan of how the rec center was set up separately. I have been seeing improvements to the rec center, but it still feels quite dated.

Snow removal has greatly improved since the city took control and invested in proper plows. We do live on a higher priority road, but I have noticed improvements in the overall service the past few years. It's been a drastic difference from when services were contracted to a third party--that was awful!

I am concerned about the budget for the police department. It seems very excessive.

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I am still shocked at the neglect Michael Shelton and the Mayor gave the citizens and ignored the city planning commission when evaluating and voting on the large land parcel at the west end of Cottonwood Heights. They are essentially turning that area into a high density segregated area from the rest of the city. We want the entire city to represent Cottonwood Heights, not just the eastern portion. In my opinion, the mayor and councilmen Shelton and Bracken failed in their responsibilities as legislative interpreters.

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I am very disappointed about development. The corner of Wasatch Blvd and Ft. Union is an eyesore. I am not sure how the infrastructure will absorb these businesses. The Walsh Farm housing development was pushed through without appropriate communication with those people with whom it would effect. I feel like this sets a precedent of how this city government does business, and it is not honest in my opinion.

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I am very disappointed with the Cottonwood Police departments slogan "Solving the Problem." I feel "Protect and Serve" is a perfect motto which cannot be improved upon. "Solving the Problem" makes me feel that if I needed help I would only be a "problem" and our community is full of "problems" not people. I have worked closely with police officers from other departments and asked if I was being to sensitive. They too felt it was inappropriate. When they asked where I lived they told me that it makes sense that our police chief would do something like that. This didn't instill confidence in his abilities.

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I appreciate the changes to snow removal system - this was an upgrade from the previous private group.

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I appreciate the fast response of the Cottonwood Heights police department, but I also worry about the motto "solve the problem" as it indicates to me, there is a constant problem.

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I appreciate the visibility/presence of the city police officers in the urban areas of the community.

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I believe the police do a good job and are paid fairly even though it is higher than surrounding areas. I am disappointed in the design of



the new Brighton High School. Environmentally and safety were not considered as highly as aesthetics but should have been more important than aesthetics

I bothers me that the cost of garbage collection and recycling has increased significantly over the past 10 years.

I don't recall. The answer your police give. Thinking it cute, To me they a pack of lying SOBS!

I don't understand why Pickleball is only open May-Sept....the hottest months of the year. I also would like to see more outside lap-swimming available without having to compete with swim teams incessantly. Even if there was just one day a week that was available to regular patron and they could go inside, that would be nice as well as having classes at 4p--I'm not sure if people would attend or not but I know a lot of moms who would love to have a class available while their kids are at activities, it's the only time we can go.

I don't appreciate the sneaky way the city Council went about planning the roundabout not informing the public and then doing it after the fact. when it's going to be a complete this dangerous disaster, The fact that the Townhall sits right across the street from the high school and the chaos in Sue's when the children are in and out in the mornings and afternoons and you think around about is going to be safe for them and traffic they don't watch for traffic lights exist now without them it's going to be utter chaos and if you people were in touch and would look out your window when it's right across the street you would realize this and would know instantly that a roundabout is a terrible terrible idea the residence in this area pretty much unanimously agreed they don't want it. And because it was a sneaky backdoor deal it was a done deal and you won't listen to us anyway so it's pretty useless at that point in time. we have city Council members that don't listen to their constituents.

I don't live in the resident area for the rec center. I really wish we could change that law so all residents could enjoy it.

I feel Cottonwood Hts, is a great place to love. Been here for 62 years.

I feel as though the police department needs to clean up their act. I feel as though the salary increase for the police chief was the good ole boys club of the city council in action. I was at the meeting and feel as though due diligence was not done. He has cost us around \$200k due to lawsuits and police action. None of that came up. I feel as though if someone questions anything they find themselves being harassed. There was only one dissenting vote and that was from the one female council member at the meeting. The other female was not present. If you don't think this is accurate, do some investigation aside from the police department involvement and find out for yourself

I feel recycling is waste of taxpayer \$\$\$. While I prefer to recycle as much as possible we could take to central locations instead of wasted containers, equipment and trucks adding to bad air quality

I gave code enforcement the lowest rating. I live on REDACTED, and I don't see much enforcement of no street parking within 24 hours of a snowstorm.

I greatly appreciate the code compliance officers correcting issues.

I grew up in Cottonwood Heights and have many cherished memories.

I had a house fire and it took the fire department 11 minutes to get to my property . . . not good when the firestation is approx a mile away

I had to file two police reports with regard to potential identity theft. The officers were responsive, thorough, and very helpful overall.

I hate hate hate the traffic. We need more patrols to stop crime. And we need better stop light controls and longer turn arrows on ALL traffic lights. More people are moving in than the roads can handle and house prices are completely unaffordable to teachers of which my wife has worked 22 years. We are forced to live in a 900 sf condo because teacher wages are a big fail. You have more people being taxed you sure as heck can pay teachers more money for the extra students they teach for that Utah and especially Salt Lake county should be ashamed. A teacher should be able to afford a home in the neighborhood he or she serves. My wife and I looked at homes this summer and we could not even afford low income housing.

I have 2 thoughts One is the city needs to make contractors of new homes & other ways that our public roads are damaged & not fixed properly after the building. There is so much building going on & almost always the roads are damaged & not fixed properly. Our roads are not maintained very well over all.

I have an issue with the snow removal. While I understand that the plows are going to plow snow back up onto the sidewalk or driveway, they also need to consider their speed. I live on REDACTED, and the drivers come down the hill SO fast that they are throwing snow upwards of 8 feet into my yard. My front lawn has been negatively impacted from all the salt each year. I have called about this, yet the snow plow drivers still head down the hill way too quickly.

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I have been told recycling is just too expensive, and all of our recycling efforts are going to the dump along with all other trash

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I have had a poor experience with snow removal. The operators push the snow to block the mailbox and I can't shovel it out.

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I have had my car window smashed in 3 times since January. Even with video of the theft, the police have no leads!

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I have had problems with code enforcement and fire code violations with the Regal homes development that is next to my home. The street plans and fire codes call for "calming gate" between my home and development. The gates have not functioned correctly and developer has been slow to fix problem. Without functioning gates, we have not had adequate access in and out of the neighborhood. This is a fire code violation due to the closest fire hydrant to my home is on the REDACTED side of the gate and the gate will not always open for emergency vehicles. Regal and recently worked again on these gates, but I feel that having them as they exist now is a danger to residents. We have no idea how they will function (get stuck) in an emergency or evacuation situation. I believe these gates create a hazard and do not improve the traffic conditions in the neighborhood.

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I have had to deal with the police department on several occasions in my very quiet neighborhood. Not only have they repeatedly harassed myself and my neighbors without reason, but they additionally wait in the neighborhood to violate people. This is not acceptable.

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I have heard some negative things about the police department, like to be zealous about speeding or waiting outside restaurants to see if people have been drinking. I personally have not had any interaction at all with the police.

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I have lived here all of my life and feel that we are losing our land. It saddens me that I have to drive to another city to walk my dogs in an undeveloped area such as Tanner Park. I wish Cottonwood Heights could save a piece of land and keep it for humans and dogs to enjoy.

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I have lived in Cottonwood Heights for the past 26 years and I love living here. Watching the community go from a 'rural' setting to one of a booming metropolis was unsettling; but the city has done an amazing job with this transition. Truly appreciate the new and improved recycling program and snow removal service. Keep up the great work!!

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I have looked around the city and am impressed with safety measures for most of the schools. But there are a few that lack much if anything, Bella Vista has a bunch of stop signs - some of them spaced at a distance too small to be legal. Though we have asked that they be removed, nothing has been done. People speed as they leave the school. We had a dumb sign painted on the street: NO TEXTING. Why not NO SPEEDING? These are a few of the frustrations we have on REDACTED. We also have mothers parking directly behind the stop sign - within 2 or 3 feet. I don't believe that is legal.

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I have not had any issue with my services. My only complaint is that the snow plows push the snow in front of my driveway creating a very large bank of snow that can cause cars to get stuck. I then have to shovel the pile of snow in the road to get my vehicles out.

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I have overall been mostly satisfied with all of the services I definitely think there is some room for improvement I feel like the snow removal is a seriously huge issue as I previously stated and will state again for the benefit of this at the end.

the police department I admire their work and could not imagine having to do the job they do encountering some of the things they do in their field of work but sometimes their approach to the public is not always handled the best. I have witnessed many times people getting pulled over just to be given a hard time and then released because of the time of year. I do not have any one particular encounter I have just seen it many different times many different ways and with many different officers from that department.

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My experience with the snow management on the other hand not so awesome last time we had a heavy snow the sidewalk had just been freshly shoveled and the snow plow as it passed me by managed to push all the snow from the road onto the sidewalk with a good portion of solid chunks of ice, bits of asphalt and snow onto the sidewalk and some hit me in the face drenching me and I had a whole other mile to walk like that because there was no protocol designed around a pedestrian walking home and the snow plowing snow off the road at a high speed.

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I have two instances of direct interaction with the planning and zoning council. Both of the experiences were less than positive. In both cases developers seemed to carry the day in their requests for re-zoning and variances. The concerns of the citizens seemed not to matter - they were politely listened to and then dismissed without comment. In both cases the result was the approval of large apartment or townhouse projects against the wishes of many citizens' concerns and strong disapprovals. This kind of "rubber stamp" approval in favor of big money developers smacks of arrogance and a blatant disregard of valid concerns. Cottonwood Heights can do better.

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I haven't checked recently, but minutes of council, planning and improvement district meetings should be available and easily accessible on the website within 10 days of the meeting.

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I know it's a known problem, but the snow removal the last 3-4 years has been a joke. Sometimes they are out in fleets when there's only a dusting and then when we get dumped on, we don't see a plow for days. We live in a cul-de-sac and last year we didn't see a snow plow for 2 days after a very large snow. Our sidewalks are very uneven and our neighborhood is poorly lit. I didn't realize those were city services, but now I'm wondering why our neighborhood's is so bad. I won't walk my dog alone after dark because our neighborhood is so dark. We had an issue in our cul-de-sac in February where some pipe broke and was flooding the area. They were quick to come tear apart the cul-de-sac, but it took 2 and a half months for the final crew to come and finish the repair, so for that whole time the middle of our cul-de-sac was gravel with emergency cones around it. It just feels like our little area is forgotten often.

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I know that I am in the minority here but I would love to see more of a dark sky initiative

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I like cottonwood heights as a location and its proximity to freeways and businesses... unfortunately i think the city and a lot of its residents are on the path to places like slc or holladay where we get to vote on other people's right and property rights. Also the cops are REDACTED and drive like REDACTED.

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I like to walk and walkability is one of the reasons I like Cottonwood Heights. I would like to see the city look for possibilities to develop additional access between the neighborhoods. A sidewalk or trail between Nutree and the Hog Wallow would be nice as would a trail along the old Wasatch road right away to the south of the old Racket Club and of course the trail through the cemetery. This is one of the few times that eminent domain purchase should be a researched option. Also it would be nice to have some snow removal of the cut throughs that are currently available such as those that go to Bywater. They get so iced over in the winter that they are impassable. Any new development should have an eye towards increasing walkability.

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I live in Cottonwood Heights city limits however do not qualify for the resident rate at the rec center...It should be available to residents

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I live in a cul-de-sac and every year the snow plow skips my circle and every year my car gets stuck in the circle while I am trying to travel to and from work.

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I would like neighborhood dumpsters at least two a year.

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I would like glass recycling stations and green waste stations

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I live in an apartment complex that no longer provides recycling, that is too bad. The new traffic patterns and lane adjustments on Highland around Fort Union seem to add extra hazards to driving. I have almost gotten side swapped b/c of the decrease from 3 lanes to 2 south of Starbucks. And, with the bus stops, the lane adjustments do not seem to be safe. Further, the lesser lanes to turn into Starbucks from the south create dangers. It does not seem like there needs to be 2 left hand turn lanes for drivers driving north and turning left onto Fort Union. This adds back up at the light. I am sure these adjustments were made for a reason, but as a resident I feel as though they make that intersection and the surrounding areas more dangerous.

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I live in an apartment so I'm not very familiar with things like garbage and snow removal because that it handled by the complex. But I've lived here for 8 years and in my limited view it's been ok.

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I live in the Prospector hills neighborhood. Our streets are a mess and the recent patchwork done to them is a joke. They need to be complete redone. The surrounding landscape is overgrown and a fire hazard, plus it's an eyesore. We also need more street lighting and sidewalk maintenance desperately.

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I live the REDACTED. I think it's ridiculous that there is no option for any sort of recycling here! I have to collect my recyclables and glass and take them elsewhere. Recycling should be mandatory, not something one has to really go out of their way to do.

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I love the Cottonwood Heights Recreation Center, although I wish the weekend hours were extended. The only real problem we have is the snow removal which is just horrendous. Sometime with an overnight snow, our street isn't plowed until late afternoon and then it's only plowed down the middle (and this is not because of cars parked on the street--we all have driveways and garages). Snow removal under Salt Lake City was spectacular. Until you solve this ongoing problem, we'll never be very happy for having incorporated to Cottonwood Heights...

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I love the weekly (glass & other) recycling, sanitation and compost pick up services; green/garbage street bin pick ups; and snow removal services.

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I need constant electricity for my O2 concentrator and my watered (for warmth) / My back is very fragile and there is no medical facility with a waterbed. under some county rule. I and my friends found it unbelievable that there is no courtesy generator big enough to handle my needs for a few days. Not from the power company or the city or United Way or anybody suggested in about two days of calling, Finally my friends bought a generator an set it up and stayed with me while the power company had its planned outages for repairs.It was pure luck that someone roped in to show me the tag they had hanging on my door. And my two friends who did the work and paid





for the generator are not always in town. Now I read in the newspaper the power company intends to shut down the power if it is hot and windy. And probably if there is a wild fire. They keep a list of people for whom cutting off the power for a while is life threatening. The City should require them to personally talk to those people every time they shut off power for any reason, and send someone out with a solar power battery or to set up and monitor my generator. The City should also have a courtesy wheelchair and O2 for residents coming to meetings. No doubt a first aid kit.

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I need help and the police responded and helped us a lot. I have been to many city council meetings and I am disappointed with the meetings and the council. I think the city should support local business owners more than other business owners. I think better notice should be given to all residents about city meetings and local issues. The swimming pool at the rec center should be for all ages on the slides and diving boards. I wanted to rent a room and you doubled the price and raised our taxes. Single family homes and codes should not be changed. Consider limiting the amount of time our mayor and council can serve. I want enforcement and codes on property maintenance. My neighborhood looks terrible and is getting worse

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I personally think the cost for green waste containers is too high. If the city wants residents to recycle their green waste, it should be more affordable

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I plan on writing an email explaining, but I have been in contact with a city employee about an issue but he abruptly stopped responding and has ignored my emails for 6+ months. Even a city council member that I'm friends with has reminded him to respond to my emails. He has not. It is very frustrating that I have not received a response.

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I really like living in Cottonwood Heights.

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I reported several code enforcement problems around the city only to be told by the officer that they couldn't do anything about the issues. The concern was weeds, cars parked on the grass, debris outside the home, lack of landscaping, full front yard garden. If we do not take care of this we will continue to look like a run down east side community. We have a rat problem and these things contribute greatly. Our municipal codes need to be updated to include specific guidelines regarding vehicle parking, percentages of xeriscaping and grass, no front yard vegetable gardens or rock only gardens, etc. Ask yourself if you would like to live next to that house. If the answer is, no, then create a fair ordinance and make sure that code enforcement is notifying and following up so we can maintain our city and property values.

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I resent the high taxes for the rec center when it is something I cannot use, even if I could afford the additional membership fee! Also, too often garbage collection is too late in the day, and I have to retrieve the containers from where they drag them down the street.

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I sometimes think that too much money is being spent on snow removal. As residents we should expect that at times we will need to drive on snow packed residential streets. Snow removal on side streets should be only for major accumulations.

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I think CWH needs more snow plows and operators. For the second time in two years, our culdesac on REDACTED was half plowed with most of the snow left at the end of our driveway which we had shoveled last night. There are no parked cars. The other three residents are all parked in their garages and there were and are not any visitors. The other culdesacs appear to be plowed, so I don't get this. We are elderly and are trapped. And, the hill leading to REDACTED is still impassable with our non-4 wheel drive car at 11 AM. Granted, the rules say that they will be cleared within 24 hours and the storm ended at 1630 yesterday. Since moving here from REDACTED six years ago where we often had as much snow as SLC but obviously not the hills, I can only remember being stranded once or twice in 68 years. Since moving here to be grandparents, we never make doctor appointments or sign up for events that occur in the winter because we can't be sure of getting out of here. I told the jury service that I couldn't report in the winter and I doubt that they believed me. Our car has 72k miles on it and we don't feel we should have to trade it in yet. Our daughter's street, REDACTED, in the same development as our culdesac, is worse, and the police never seem to ticket the parked cars on that street, some of which I believe are due to an Airbnb on that street. When I hear about projects like making a round-about near Brighton HS and the police station that I think is unnecessary since the traffic is only bad for a couple of hours a day, I am unhappy. My 77 year old husband had shoveled our driveway at 1700 yesterday, Nov. 29, and it is noon on Nov. 30 and people are slipping and sliding on the hill to Creek and we can't get out of our culdesac.

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I think Cottonwood Heights is a high cost area to live in and especially outsourced services are too expensive. We have no control over constant increases. We need to do a better job negotiating so we can keep Cottonwood Heights affordable to new families that want to move in the area.

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I think overall Cottonwood Heights does a great job. It's always a challenge managing budgets with ongoing deferred maintenance issues. Continue focusing on keeping our taxes at minimum by reducing unneeded government services while maintaining safety,

streets, etc. Thanks for doing a good job.

I think pressure needs to be placed on Sandy City and the state of Utah to finish Highland Drive. The land has been setting ready to do this for years and now it is going to cost much more to get it completed.

I think recycling should have bins - paper, plastic and include glass

I think that the city is doing a good job.

I think that the firefighters and police as spectacular at doing their job. I am satisfied with garbage collection, and with our water services. I do think the biggest improvement could be made to snow removal services. These services are prompt when it comes to cleaning Ft. Union and Highland, but not the surrounding neighborhoods. There have been times I have had to miss half of a days work because I could not make it out to the main streets due to the snow.

I think the new road that was changed was changed for the worst. I don't like the idea of a round ab out by Brighton High School. I think the traffic will be worse and student put at risk.

I think the owners of properties being rented should be responsible for the yard maintenance.

I think the premiums for the Rec. Center are too high for families that pay such high property taxes. I would like to see the exercise and fitness directors be taken care of better as we continue to lose good directors and the programs are deteriorating.

I think waste service is very expensive...I don't know what other places cost, I just think it is high. And I saw one question posed to charge for recycling, which is supposed to pay back, which I do not think it does or why would they ask if I would mind paying.

I understand that even though Recycling continues as far as picking it up, but that it is still ending up in a landfill. This seems like a waste of resources, what needs to happen to get recycling going again?

I used the paramedics and ambulance services when I had a stroke. they were very helpful and did an excellent job. One of the snow plows ran into my two garbage can, knocked them over and never picked them up. The parade this year on bengal blvd. was excellent. Do it again next year.

I want more flexibility for garbage and recycling services. I pay the same amount as large families, but use much less services. Recycling maybe once a month. Could be shared with my neighbors and still wouldn't be more than 2x p/mo. Garbage only slightly more. and the summer containers are a joke, not enough containers. We didn't even get one this year. But it's included in the pricing. I write them many letters but of course they don't less money, so they ignore. I live alone and generate very little garbage . I want Senior citizen discounts.

I wish that green waste was incentivized. There's a huge benefit locally and waste-wise to keep this out of our trash, but I don't want to pay \$10/month additionally, so I end up throwing previous green waste in the trash. So many other communities (Durango being an example) of green waste being collected for free, and at the end of the year, people get a free bag of compost out of it. We need to look at sustainability of our resources. I also wish water were more regulated and more heavily taxed because we are in the mountain desert and need to use our water more wisely. More benefits to support homeowners in green and sustainable living would be excellent.

I wish that recycling was more complete.

I wish there was better enforcement of making homeowners keep the sidewalk clear of trees and bushes. I think we should encourage residents to pull out grass in parking strips. I wish there was better enforcement of weeds and junky yards for landlords and sites under development. The old Canyon Racquet Club is an eye sore.

I wish we had a Dog Park in our city so as not to have to drive to SLC

I wish we had a city ordinance outlawing pit bulls and aggressive breed dogs. I also wish we had a city ordinance making it illegal to obstruct neighbor views with trees and walls. The resident who lives below me planted 40 foot trees. I'd like to see the city outlaw rude and obnoxious acts that destroy property values on view lots.

I worry that we are not properly maintaining our roads in the city. I know my neighbors have complained about snow removal, but I think the city has found an okay balance that does mean we may have to wait a little longer for secondary roads to be cleared.

I would like glass recycling. I hate the gravel pit, it is an eyesore and health menace. We should definitely do all we can to remove it!!!!

I would like to know why there aren't any street lights in my neighborhood at all.

It makes it very difficult especially in the winter

I would like to see a larger indoor track at the Recreation Center

I would like to see more classes for adults and children at the rec center.





I would like to see more inclusive educational programs in Canyons school district for children who don't qualify for IEP's and a 504 but are still struggling. For example counseling sessions on executive management functioning, social skills ( directed towards children who are repeat bully offenders) and study skill classes to help children who struggle with focusing issues and organizational skills. More lighting for our streets and more holiday lighting through November and December to cheer things up a bit. Solutions for the pollution we get every winter. Thank you.

I would like to see more ways of promoting water conservation - namely promoting xeriscaping and removal of lawns in favor of low-water plants

I would like to see stronger enforcement for those people who let their property become deplorable junk yards and rat havens. This affects our property value as well.

I would like to see the community clean-up garbage collection happen more than once a year.

I would like to see the return of leaf collection. Taking multiple trips with a vehicle full of leaf bags is not an easy nor convenient task.

I would sure like to see parks improved and our streets and sidewalks tidied up and more manicured

I'd like to see us preserve what we have rather than try to "grow". I see no benefits to growth for the sake of growth. Limiting high density housing and office buildings will preserve the quality lifestyle I moved here and paid a premium for in the first place.

I've had water service needs that were promptly taken care of in spite of holiday abs late hour needs. Also had the street light promptly replaced with a stomps message left on the answering machine.

I've never seen anyone use the bike lane on 2300 East by the post office. There is now a traffic bottleneck there when traffic is heavy because the middle lane was removed for unused bike lane.

I've seen small fender benders where there have been 3 police vehicles on the scene. This is excessive.

I've stopped recycling altogether because of all the new strict rules about recycling. Recycling shouldn't be so difficult.

Also the Public Works department is outstanding. They work tirelessly to keep our roads in shipp shape and they did an excellent job handling the construction this last summer.

IF police is considered to be an emergency service, they do an inadequate job with youth related issues. There are county services which are available BUT the police department does not use them regularly if at all. Unsure if it is "takes too much time" or lack of management emphasis on dealing with troubled youth.

If third party services are considered, They must be the low Qualified bidder.....

If costs for recycling are too high we should go to everyother week. They are not able to recycle a lot of what is put in. It makes more sense to reduce costs by educating people on what can be recycled and collect less often instead of increasing costs.

Ignoring the recommendations of planning & zoning on the development of the Walsh property will cost the taxpayers big time in the long run. Negligence will not be defensible in court when someone is maimed or killed on 13th East & 6710 S. intersection. The citizens ultimately will bear the costs for Clty Council's irresponsible approval of the size of Ivory's project its impact on traffic. Poor choice!!

Improve education about recycling, particularly about Plastic number 7. Maybe consider a program similar to San Francisco where recycling is more integrated into our culture.

Improvements are needed on sidewalks. Kids (students) shouldn't have to walk in the street.

Some City financial support to help people who want to improve the parking strips in front of their homes.

Financial support to concerned citizens who want to install solar panels. Let's clean the air

In general the streets are well maintained and crews try hard to minimize the impact of repairs on traffic flow, which is greatly appreciated. Residential snow removal should start earlier in the morning and be more frequent. As a physician I frequently need to leave by 6am or occasionally need to leave for an emergency in the middle of the night, and when we've had a bad storm, I'm driving through my neighborhood in 8+ inches of snow.

Indoor specialty pool At the Rec center was very dirty. Won't be going back.

It has been such a relief to have CH handling the snow removal services as opposed to the contractors from Col. that did it several years ago.

It is unfortunate that those of us that live east of Wasatch Blvd do not have "residents" status at the Cottonwood Heights rec center, due to some (in my opinion) poor decision making in the past. I would like to see that rectified so that residents in Cottonwood Heights are all considered "residents" for that membership at the rec center.

It takes a long time to fill the potholes in the neighborhood.

It would be beneficial to have a nearby glass recycling drop off area.

It would be excellent to move forward with the best interest of our current residents as our guiding light.

It would be nice for the services that collect recycling/ green waste to educate the public a little more regarding what they accept and how to properly dispose of it so recycling doesn't become contaminated and to encourage everyone to recycle/ use green bins

It would be nice to get a notice of the once a year dumpster drop off... last yeR they skipped our area and when my neighbor called they had forgotten us.. we had an unannounced dumpster drop off for 6 hours .. lame!

It would be nice to have a street junk pick up once a month

Right above our house, there are lots of illnesses that come from that. I think it's time to close it. Our yards are always dirty or tables we have to keep our doors closed windows closed. It's just sickening

I'm concerned about high density housing and allowing citizens a vote on what's going to be built.

I'm hoping the snow removal will continue to get better! Last year was a positive start after the prior debacle when we had almost NO snow removal service! I hope that the enforcement officers spend time closely watching over the snow crews and what they are actually doing! We the tax payers don't love paying for shoddy work and then getting the excuses and we're sorry's that are so prevalent in this political arena! However, I do appreciate the your willingness to serve our city!

Keep Chief Russo around. Does an excellent job. Expand the jogging trail around the entire city. Add bike lanes. Add museum, arts, like Hale Theater or Sandy Amplitheater.

Keep government small respect the current density, dont take bribes from developers and respect the individuals already living here.

Letting residents know more than a day in advance that their street is being resurfaced would be nice.

Plowing my street when there is nothing to plow is ridiculous. I know there are other ancillary streets that never get plowed and those residents would love to have their street cleared in a more timely fashion.

How about fixing street lamps that are out? My street lamp has been on the fritz for the last three years.

Observation! There are many homes who do not understand that the space between the sidewalk and the road is to be maintained by the home owner. Many of these areas are a disgrace.

Offer glass recycling.

Officer Lovato with animal control/code enforcement really handled a animal problem like a champ with a neighbor. The problem was resolved and he was very responsive and reassuring.

On Highland Dr. between the left turn to Brighton High and Creek Road, the speeding and rudeness of drivers are pretty bad. Both going north and south.

Also, would like to see City lobby for Google fiber or any fiber. Cable is ridiculous and expensive.

Ordinance enforcement requires numerous calls/emails to get response. Side streets are in terrible repair.

Ordinance officers dont listen even when talked to personally!

Our Police, Fire and Code Enforcement officers are exceptional. They are a large part of what makes our city such an attractive place to live.

Our Street needs Repair

Our cul-de-sac is often/usually forgotten for snow removal.

Our dead end street can sit unplowed until the night time, but go out to the main street and plows are driving on clear streets.

Our neighborhood has Salt Lake City water, we don't have any public roadwork or snow removal of our area, and we get mail from Alta Canyon p.o. It is hard to decide which services Cottonwood Heights directly provides to this neighborhood. We did live in another neighborhood before this more directly served than our current one.

Our neighborhood has horrible roads currently. We ride bikes and we have had many bike accidents from the potholes that get disintegrated material everywhere that make it unsafe for bike riding.

Also, we live on a cul-de-sac, on a hill, that rarely gets plowed effectively by the city. It is unsafe for us to drive in in snowy conditions. We have to plow it ourselves, which the city has asked us not to do, but when the city ignores our street we have to do it ourselves so we can safely get out and then home again.

Our particular neighbor hood has homes where the owners don't take good care of their property. Not sure what needs to be done to improve appearance of neighborhood.



Our road sucks. We've lived on REDACTED for 30 years and our road has never been paved with the good asphalt. It always gets that gravel crap or just patched sporadically. Why can't REDACTED get real paving like they get in the Top Of The World area? The road needs to be ground up with new asphalt laid. It is so crowned now, that it hurts to walk on it if you are not in the middle of the road.

Our snow removal crew has been doing a great job and we appreciate their quality and preparedness. Our police department has one of the fastest response times in the valley and we would like to thank them for their professionalism and their courtesy. Our fire department is understaffed but they provide a quality service. We'd like to see more of them here.

Our street gutters have been hit multiple times with plows to the point of needing repair. When we called CH they told us this would be our responsibility and we're not helpful with starting a process. In Murray, the city just redid an entire neighborhood- including sidewalks, full driveways, gutters and potholes. With no cost to the residents

Our street is constantly being obstructed with parked cars, despite the promises of the former mayor, Culimore. He Lied. Two cars can't pass each other in the road.

Our street is one of the last to see a snow plow.

Our street needs some curb and gutter work (REDACTED) and when I call the city, they don't respond or do not really seem to care. The curbing has been the same for the last 50 years.

Parking is poorly managed on streets west of 7/11 at mouth of canyon. Public is poorly informed regarding recycling. Residents restrict access to foothill trails, except Ferguson. Lake Bonneville Shoreline trail needs better support. Unnecessary amount spent to build City office buildings.

Parks and Recreation - we need an off-leash dog park in Cottonwood Heights. Please!

Past 911 calls were responded to quickly and professionally

People want more green space, but we see every single piece of land being developed into more housing. The property taxes are going to price us out of our house (retired) and there is nothing we can do about it. We don't think the city uses the tax money collected very well.

Personally I have had good service from code enforcement and planning. However, code enforcement at time seems to be over loaded. Zoning and building codes are inadequate with regard to R18 building height and the methodology employed in the measurement is designed to subvert the 35 ft max limit. Outdoor residential lighting needs to be regulated so that one neighbor cannot overwhelm an entire community with such lighting. Police need to be aware of codes so that when building and noise violations occur "after hours" they can respond appropriately. There appears to be a lack of coordination between code enforcement and regular police.

Please attend to the developers and their undue influence in silencing citizens

Please consider getting rid of recycling. The foreign countries that we used to send our garbage to are not taking it anymore. By shipping plastic all over the world, we greatly increase the chance it will end up in the ocean. Disposing of plastic properly in a landfill is best for the environment. Recycling costs extra money, results in more pollution, and requires extra trucks driving around.

Please devote more resources to code enforcement for yards and vehicles parked at residences.

Please stop ticketing off-leash dogs at Ferguson Canyon. And please pave my road decently. It is in poor shape.

Police Department is FANTASTIC

Police are always quick to respond, as well as fire and paramedics.

Police are fast, professional, and instill trust. Outstanding work by this department!

Police are very quick to respond when we have called. Wish there was a way to keep a better eye on the car thieves that cover the area at night.

Police officers need to make sure they b are acting in good faith for the citizens and not harass or profile them....I think they violate a lot of laws and citizens rights and nothing ever gets done about it cause they are the law. They need to trim trees that are touching telephone poles and fix all the curb and gutter not bits and pieces....

Police services are spending too much money for a City our size - outrageous expensive vehicles

Police were friendly and quick to respond with a theft issue. I think that if you want to promote recycling, the bins should be included in a monthly fee instead of additional. Or have more glass and green waste drop off locations.

Poor ordinance follow up. Lack of updated zoning policy will change the character of the city.

Pretty much satisfied with services

Previously stated in a comment :)

Public awareness and great service by the Police Department.

Rarely are city ordinances enforced. People don't shovel their sidewalks, cars are parked on the streets so plows can't plow (when the plows eventually show up, which is not as often as they should), dogs run free in the parks, people run red lights constantly, and nothing is ever done. You raise our taxes until we are almost priced out of our homes, and yet services are not reciprocated. Yet you have money to expand Butlerville Days every year, which should either pay for itself or be eliminated. Do we get value for what we pay? No. If you actually enforced laws with fines, you could reduce or eliminate our taxes altogether with the money you would raise.

Re: code enforcement...there are a number of derelict homes and other properties in neighborhoods that detract from what our city should look like. Codes, establishment of codes and enforcement of codes needs to be a priority.

Really disappointed in the neighborhood cleanup. Bins are immediately full & gone before you have a chance to use them. Leaf cleanup is a joke & insufficient. Never had a Xmas tree picked up in 14 yrs. No glass recycle. Lack of updated storm drains & too much building caused flooding this year. Even though we pay high property taxes we apparently have no rec privileges East of Wasatch.

Rec center is great and staff is wonderful. New gym equipment is great. Seems like too many police with not much to do.

Rec center is old - parking stinks, slco recs have better programs and cheaper to use.

Received a ticket for having my car parked in front of my house with expired registration (by one month). Was not driving the car, there was not snow yet (11/18/19). Did not receive any warning before being ticketed. Moved the car within 24 hours, but unable to fight the ticket without spending 3-4 hours at the Holladay Court. I feel we should have at the very least received a warning notice, but was told when calling later that it was in the officer's discretion whether or not to give a warning first. Really frustrated that I now have a \$75 citation when there are cars all throughout the neighborhood habitually parked on the street. I feel like I was unfairly targeted. Also, the expired registration should not have been an issue because we were not driving the vehicle.

Recent recycling restrictions are disappointing, as we need to take better care of environment

Recreation center is too expensive, despite living in the service district. Much, much less expensive to go somewhere else.

Recycle program does not include enough recyclable material, and pickup and cost is only necessary twice each month

Recycling costs more and they take less

Recycling forgot pickup in our neighborhood one week, our street is often one of the last plowed making it difficult to get to work some days. I like that our road is resurfaced every few years, parks are well maintained, rec center is a good deal and well maintained, new city hall is nice, glad schools are being rebuilt.

Recycling has become more difficult - the restrictions have made it so that less and less is now recycled - I'm not sure it is worth the high cost.

Recycling options have actually gone down. We should be doing more, not less.

Recycling pickup frequency could be half as often and half the cost

Recycling seems to be of questionable value in the current waste market.

Recycling used to be a service that would PAY the party recycling. Now we pay them to profit from us? Garbage.

Recycling was going to the landfill? I watched the trash truck pick up the recycling more than once.

Regarding road maintenance, the street in my neighborhood has never been repaved in the 26 yrs I've lived here. It was chip sealed once which made it dangerous for bikes riding in and caused me to crash once. The street has become even worse in the decade after that ill considered chip seal process.

Remove Flouride from water, a mistake could cost tens of millions it's not worth the risk and people now days don't like that, in fact people would move to where there is no flouride in the water.

Remove the speed indicators on 23rd East, the police do NOT enforce. The average speed is over the 35 mph posted.

Repair of drainage problem in Hidden Mill subdivision....excellent. Widening of Cottonwood Canyon rode...excellent. EMT ....emergency service...excellent

Residential clean up needs to be more than once per year. Bins fill quickly. Unless your there when the bins are dropped off they'll be full by the time you get home

Road and street dept. is completely out of control. The recent 18 month project to change intersection highland/ft Union, is good example. We have lived in the CH area 42 years and have never had a problem until now. The intersection is a joke



Now you are thinking of installing a roundabout at Bengal/2325 East. Since we live on REDACTED we see no need, and believe that the change will make it unbearable and dangerous. Students don't obey traffic regulations now, and will not obey with roundabout. That money could be better spent filling chuck and pot holes. Example see the sink hole on 2325 East. Shame on you. The county did a better job!

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Road and street repairs are a total joke, and snow removal is almost non existent in most instances. Yes, I've read your whole policy on getting main roads cleared of snow first, then secondary roads as plows are available. That's just not what happens. Five years ago, or so, roads were cleared on residential streets almost as quickly as main streets.

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Road repairs getting better but Fort Union from 3000 East to the Canyon needs help it is so uneven and bouncy needs scraping and new road put on top.

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Road slope at the south end of Claret street Bridgewater intersection is sloped such that the snow plow digs up the asphalt every winter. Eventually it gets repaired in spring to fall season, but the basic problem is never fixed. Some road expert should find a real fix, it should save money in the long run.

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Salt Lake City GOUGES us on water rates. They are terrible. It would not be easy, but we need a secondary water source for lawns and such

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Salt Lake City Water is over charging Cottonwood Heights residents. They use their power without apology. And they are almost impossible to deal with.

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Scottish drive has had major flooding issues with no drainage. Over building has created this but not good city planning to help. Our streets look terrible. A new water line was out in but only a section of that road was recovered. No potholes right next to it we're fixed. Our neighborhood is extremely dark which some may like but to me is not a friendly neighborhood feel. Some neighborhoods look trashy, not just houses but streets and sidewalks.

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My personal option is the 4-way stop at danish and creek is dangerous and drivers do not abide the law correctly there. What is a better solution?! Our middle school kids have to apply for a permit for the bus when there is no sidewalk access on dangerous parts of danish. A simple solution is to grant bus access to all those south of that section. Instead nothing is done to improve the road or help our children.

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Seems like the attention is given to development which serve primary constituency, businesses and a pro growth agenda. Here very little about inclusion and diversity.

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Shameful that new snow trucks sit out the weather. Where is maintaince done? Hope there is rotation plan so don't have to buy new trucks at the same time. Need a dog park.

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Sidewalk in disrepair in front of my house, storm drain constantly flooding and no one will take responsibility- both decrease my property value and are unsightly to the neighborhood.

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Sidewalks need to be repaired and replaced

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Sidewalks, streets and street lighting all need improvement

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Small fender benders do not require 3 police vehicles to respond. I've seen this on multiple occasions. It's frustrating to see our tax dollars sitting in the parking lot of city hall in the form of a SWAT van and another large van that never seem to move.

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Snow Removal has improved a bit in the last year but typically it's pretty poor and days late

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Snow plow are unreliable, behdn they show up, poor job.

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Snow plow trucks throw snow up onto our driveway creating a big job for us. (County service before city incorporation did not plow us in.) The irrigation company that controls stream diversion from Deaf Smith's Creek is taking 100% of the water year round. This is illegal, is killing species in creek below diversion and is unfair to all homeowners living along Deaf Smith's Creek in the Kings Hill/Golden Hills and neighborhoods west of Wasatch Blvd.

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Snow plowing is late or nonexistent

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Snow plows always do a horrible job in our circle. Seems like we are always last to get done, then they go too fast and don't take the time to do it right.

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Snow plows put snow in front of driveways

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Need a light at 3200 E. Cars speed down 7000 S and you can't see them until you have pulled out in front of them



Snow plows will come down the street in front of us but not plow our circle making it harder for us to get out as they leave a big barrier from the street plowing in addition to not plowing the circle at all. We have had to call many times to get them to come back. Seems like a waste of money for the city not to do the entire neighborhood while they are here. And it is maddening!!

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Snow removal broke my mailbox but fixed it and replaced in an appropriate time.

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Snow removal continues to be poor, and commonsense measures like pushing snow windrows onto the sunny side of the street and pre-salting obvious trouble spots continue to be ignored. Meanwhile, the Mayor and Council seem preoccupied with issues far out of their lane and above their pay grade, like pretending to solve global climate change.

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Snow removal has been an issue over the years. It feels like the first few snow storms are always a mess. Things have improved with the city taking over and not contracting it. Even with the change, last year the first few snowfalls, it took a while for streets to get cleared.

Road and sidewalk maintenance seems to be under funded. It feels like there are lots of cracks on secondary roads even though they have been "coated" in the recent years.

I like to walk/job around my neighborhood and it is problematic with the conditions of the sidewalks (or lack thereof). And while I know some of the roads maybe UTA issue (Wasatch/Danish) it contributes to the area being less than useful and unsafe to use. And during the summer, there are many homeowners that allow for their plants to over-grow the sidewalks that do exist. Does anyone monitor that and ask homeowners to clear that up?

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Snow removal has been good some years and awful others. Living on a cul de sac and not on a main road we are often last to be dug out and then not well. The drivers are courteous and overworked but it would be nice to make it out to the main road

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Snow removal has been horrible since the city canceled the contract with the County from the debacle of the private company to the current city employees.

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Snow removal has been inadequate at best. There were snow storms when our cul-de-sac did not get plowed until 3 days after a storm. Also, there have been several times when road maintenance has put up dangerous road barriers. There was not even warning before lanes merging and lanes ending at the bottom or top of a blind hill.

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Snow removal has been mediocre at best for the past 4-5 years. So many changes, and little to no improvement. Our circle frequently goes unplowed for more than 24 hrs after a storm.

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Snow removal has been very poor since Cottonwood Heights quit using County service.

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Snow removal has improved over the last few years. but as my home is in a cul-de-sac we go days without snow removal after large storm

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Snow removal in my area remains dreadful, road and sidewalk maintenance are sketchy and growth is not in keeping the the quiet suburban quality of the city

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Snow removal is NEVER completely done like it was before the City took over. They clear it to get cars to drive but NEVER come back for clean up even days later. It should be cleared to the curb like in the past.

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Snow removal is a hard subject. I live in a circle, so it is never plowed until late in the day. When they do come through, they plow a single lane around the circle and leave. This leaves a big mound of snow in front of my driveway. I do have to admit that the other day when it snowed, this is what they did, but then they came back later and plowed the whole circle leaving a couple of mounds where it was acceptable. So I am hoping that things will be better this year than in past years. I just know when it switched management a few years ago it really went downhill. Here's to hoping it will be better this year. ALSO, do I have to request street pot holes or where the concrete is breaking up to be fixed? In front of my driveway where it meets the street we have gaping holes where the concrete is breaking up. It makes it dangerous for my kids when riding bikes or even when I am out walking with a stroller. I have a hard time getting into my driveway at times with those stroller wheels. I have noticed that other houses have had a patch job but I haven't had one at my house. Then when it comes to sidewalks bumping up, I haven't noticed any repair jobs on those. A couple years ago we were notified of the streets being redone and that NEVER happened. No notice was sent out to say 'nevermind' or anything. I assume there were no funds for that to happen.

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Snow removal is a joke- if you purchase a home in a cul-de-sac in Cottonwood Heights you'd better have a high clearance vehicle with four wheel drive if you expect to leave your driveway for at least two days following a storm. As for the street maintenance, West Valley is looking less dilapidated than Cottonwood Heights. It is embarrassing how awful the streets look and the city's response was to

temporarily fill the massive potholes with loose asphalt. It looks like crap!!! Also, what Zone Enforcement??? Where are they?

Snow removal is much better now than when CH contracted those services to an outside company. Sidewalk maintenance is an issue that needs some clarity and attention — I had a very bad fall 18 months ago due to uneven sidewalks.

Snow removal is much better with county support. Thank you. Love the annual garbage containers but wish it happened twice per year.

Snow removal is not enough on snow days

Snow removal is terrible on residential streets that don't connect to a main thoroughfare. We need a dog park. The rec center is great. Affordable housing for young families is a concern. There are many things we can't recycle, like glass. Police and fire depts seem good. City codes are not always enforced.

Snow removal is terrible. I live in a circle, and do not expect it to be plowed first, however last winter after 4 days of waiting for a plow, a mini truck managed to make it one house up the block and deposited it's load in front of my driveway. My 85 year old neighbor got stuck and he and I ( I was 2 months out of knee replacement) shoveled out. 3 days later a bigger truck came and once again plowed all the snow we had shoveled out smack into my driveway!

There has to be a better way!

Snow removal made great improvement last year. In prior years it seemed pretty slow, but in 2018/2019 they did a really great job.

Snow removal needs to be much closer to the curbs. Post Office wont deliver mail unless I clear to the curb, at times eight feet.

Snow removal on our street has deteriorated greatly since the City took over the service. We have lived here more than 30 years and it is the worst it has ever been, Even under the contractor that was fired it was better. Plows don't come within 10 feet of our mailbox/driveway

Snow removal on supernal way is not acceptable. I have a front wheel drive car that on several days last year I could not make it to top of the world and make my way down the hill to Wasatch.

Snow removal operators always push the snow on to our sidewalk and the piles can be as high as 6 feet. We have asked them not to do this and they have been very receptive to our request.

Snow removal priorities are not correct. Salt lake county did a much better job.

Snow removal seems to have gotten better over the past 5 years but it's still fairly atrocious compared to most of the places I've lived in Utah. Both increasing the number of plows and the quality of those driving them (so many knock icy snow right into our driveway) would be appreciated! I've always been impressed with the Cottonwood Heights Rec Center and the activities there and nearby, though. That's a definite positive from living here.

Snow removal services around mail boxes needs to improve.

Snow removal still sub-standard

Snow removal was so much better when the county was doing it. Still not even close now to what was provided then. When the plow eventually comes it makes one pass down the street. County came promptly every time and always did both sides of the street.

Snow removal, road maintenance and traffic congestion with recent "improvement" to Highland Drive are of concern.

Snow removing was hit and miss. It seemed to get better as winter progressed But was still was not really good.

Some city codes are not enforced fairly.

Something needs to be done for the residents on and near Wasatch Blvd. Since they changed the light, there is no break in the morning or evening rush hours for pedestrians to cross.

Sometimes it feels like we might have more police than we really need. I tend to mostly see them running speed traps or filling out paperwork where Winger's used to be on 13th. I feel like maybe we could save some money by maybe contracting out major crimes to Unified and focusing more on patrols and burglaries/thefts. My area butts up against REDACTED, and in the last 5-10 years we've mostly had problems with a few burglaries and petty thefts. We did have Dr. Theodoro the Oxycontin king busted, but that was kind of an outlier. You send a cop down the road occasionally, and follow up on small crimes to see if there's maybe a meth/pawn shop ring running and we're pretty much covered. I see speed traps more as the police are bored/need quotas, or we're hard up for funds for the police/courts. I have liked seeing our police taking on shoplifters in the Target/Home Depot area and around the liquor store. Seems like we do a good job protecting business in high traffic areas.

Stop spending money on stupid shit like solar powered stop signs. Thre area now

Known as Cottonwood Heights was a much better place to live when it was part of the unincorporated county!

Stop trying to turn Cottonwood Heights into an Urban development. If that is what we wanted we would have bought homes in





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Sugarhouse, Park City or another Urban area. We chose Cottonwood Heights because we wanted to live in a suburban area.

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Street light has been out for over 1 year, road has terrible ruts.

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Street lighting is too bright. Roads aren't maintained all that well--if I want to avoid potholes & dips, I look like I'm driving drunk! Snow removal is terrible & we should have kept the county program for that. Too much money is spent on religious holiday events; the Easter egg roll comes to mind. Best thing about the city is the Rec Center.

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Street resurfacing - Streets have recently been resurfaced using a process of applying gravel rather than asphalt. This leaves the streets very coarse which makes for a poor surface for anything but cars. The kids (and some adults) in my neighborhood like to skateboard/ride scooters for fun and transportation. The streets are too coarse for these small hard wheels and are now unridable. It might sound silly but this is my number one concern with the city. Please go back to smooth asphalt.

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Terrible snow removal

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Thanks for opportunity to give feedback!!

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The CH rec center is in desperate need of a major update. The locker rooms are atrocious. The TRX classes have been cut in half and moved to a claustrophobic space. The lifeguards are often paying no attention at the pools (as a former pool manager, I notice this the most). Our fitness instructors are ridiculously underpaid.

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The CHRC still has few programs for youth hockey. We have too much traffic, not enough bike lanes and safe walking routes for kids to get to school. The road guys went Willy nilly on the tar and only went over about 50% of the cracks and tarred non-cracked areas. The sidewalks along Ft. Union Blvd are consistently not being cleared within the legal timeframe. The neighbor across the street blows all his snow into the street and the plows push all of it in front of my cleared driveway - every time it snows, but no enforcement of the law to not do that.

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The City Mayor and Councils does put forward a great effort to make this a place where citizens are being heard( but we do not always agree, that is democracy) and Administration and staff is committed to serve. So much better that the old County days.

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The City of Cottonwood Heights has been remiss in creating off leash dog parks. Yes, that was plural a single dog park would get "loved to death".

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The Cottonwood Heights Rec Center is one of the MOST poorly managed and run facilities. It is heavily used and it is falling apart.

Funding needs to be granted to make it more updated and there needs to be management that actually cares and can make it the facility that it should be. The director should be embarrassed.

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I think the code enforcement in the city is terrible. There sure are a lot of rules, that obviously do not need to be enforced. Cars on the streets during snow storms, terribly maintained yards, firework enforcement and overall feelings that there are rules/codes, but hey they don't matter.

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The Rec Center and Whitmore library are gems. Keep them going strong.

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The Rec Center director, a man, seemed to fill the weight room with more machines meant for men. Women want and need the sitting thigh machine. Improvement could be made in the areas of respect and positive response to women's needs and requests.



The Rec Center re-did the work out room and choose not to replace the thigh machines, most popular with woman. I was told by the manager to use a large rubber band. Very rude. I'm too old for that, I don't have the strength and cordination. He said there wasn't room yet they have duplicates of weight lifting bars. Many have complained and have been ignored. I feel he's prejudice against women. He should be fired.

The Snow removal have torn up the concrete Gutters in front of our home when they push the snow onto sidewalk that I have to keep clearing everytime they clean the road and we live on a circle not sure why they just done use the center to pile it up.

The Superhero Bike Ride was cute, but the turnout was not great. The city might want to look at all the events like this they sponsor and see if some of them should be canceled and city efforts placed else where. Snow Removal is always a challenge. I live in a cul-de-sac and the drivers always do these last and late in the day, plus they push the snow on top of the already shoveled sidewalks.

The animal control gentleman was very wonderfully helpful when my new dog got off her leash. I called him and he responded right away. He helped me track her down.

The application approval for the 12 unit work/live townhouses (REDACTED) at the last (October) city council meeting was not a responsible decision. The residents living on REDACTED will be significantly and negatively affected by that structure. I like the structure itself but it is planned the wrong location. Just because the developer wants to make profits does NOT mean the city has to approve of development that is bad for the current residents. Some (about 3) council members hesitated and I could tell they were very concerned, but then they voted in favor, I believe very reluctantly. Those members should not feel the pressure to "go with the flow". They should vote for what is "right". It's important to note that I live about 3 miles away and am not affected and I do not know any person on either side of the issue, nor do I know any of the council members, so, this is an unbiased opinion. Please stand up for the current residents of the city. In this event you did not, and you should be disheartened.

The asphalt replaced last year was the most inept job ever, we the tax payers will be paying for this again soon. FIRE the person in charge of the cities infrastructure.

The big garbage collection should be twice a year. Having it once a year is not enough. The containers are filled up by the time the resident gets home from work. Additionally, if the resident is out of town on the date of collection, he needs to wait two years to use this service.

The garbage and recycling program are good. But it would be nice if all the services were included, namely, glass, recycling, green waste. Charging more for these services only encourages people not to utilize them and this adds to the already huge problem disposing consumer waste. We live a beautiful environment, locally and globally, lets keep it beautiful by disposing of all our waste properly!

The building code should be modifies, if there are problems with traffic, safety or problems to local residents.

The bulk waste and leaf collection is always very frustrating to navigate.

The city has talked for over a decade about adding a dog park and still hasn't. It is creating problems in other areas. We live east of wasatch and snow removal is improving, but has been a problem. The city needs to police ski vehicles that are driving through neighborhoods to avoid wasatch.

The city planner and people in charge of planning are arrogant, difficult to work with, and unavailable when needed.

The city shouldn't run a rec center. The city should do a recycling program.

The city would benefit from more neighborhood street lights and repairing old side walks. The side wall near Dan's grocery store within the neighborhood is completely mangled and dangerous.

The creation of a hazardous and dangerous looping of Wasatch Blvd between Big and Little Cottonwood Canyons. The Routing of traffic from east side residents of Draper, etc. to Wasatch Blvd. Is going to result in many traffic accidents and kill even more Deer, especially during the winter.

The culture here is oppressive and non inclusive. The schools don't allow bullying but not including others and being exclusive of others is a major factor of our entire family unhappiness. Most places have issues like race or socioeconomic issues but here it is clear non Mormons are not included or welcome.

The drainage in our gutters is terrible

The drinking water has a different taste than those residents in Sandy or Holladay.

The extrajudicial water sertvices by Salt Lake City PU is overpriced and slow. Why are we paying more than SLC residents for water that is within our boundaries? Big Cottonwood and Little Cottonwood treatment plants; especially since the water sources, plants, property

are not within SLC boundaries. I think SouthValley services would be much better served by the SouthValley.

The fire department is amazing. I see them regularly in the grocery stores and they are so cheerful and friendly. I don't have similar experiences with the police and that is disappointing. Rather than parked looking for people doing wrong I'd rather see them interacting with folks in more positive ways.

The garbage is getting picked up later in the day and they missed a day in the last quarter.

The garbage trucks move cans into driveway or too far into streets when emptying them. Or they spill garbage when emptying

The lighting for the intersection of Keswick and Creek road needs to be improved. Enforcement of construction vehicles overnight on streets need to be improved.

The lighting on our street is very poor (Privet Drive)

The many programs (i.e. recycling, etc) are not well communicated. I could not find any info about glass recycling on CH website for example. Improving the website to make the latest city votes on new ordinances (i.e. Sustainability, No Idling, Dark Skies) should be EASILY found and promptly posted.

The new city administration seems to be struggling to manage costs and is prone to raise taxes rather than find ways to cut costs. I'm very concerned about the roundabout planned for the corner of REDACTED. Not sure how that is going to protect our high school students who are continually walking thru that intersection. Snow removal is slow.

I would like to see an ordinance that protects view lots from neighbors planting trees that destroy that important contributor to property value.

The new intersection at Ft Union Blvd and Highland Drive made the traffic much slower. Having 3 to 2 lanes change northbound made traffic quite dangerous and slow.

The only negative issue I have with the snow removal is how they plow the snow into my driveway to the point I would rather not have them come by so often.

The parks are really nice. I think it would be nice to have a section in each park (or some of them) where dog can legally be off leash to get some exercise.

Things need to get really bad before ordinance enforcement can step in and require messy yard to clean up and take care of their animals.

I think that the city should not be investing in commercialization and leave that to investors that are not on the city council with a conflict of interest.

I do feel that the neighborhood is as safe as any other and that is important to me. For the most part, I have really great neighbors.

The place where the sand and plow trucks are stored on 3000east is needing some landscaping to the entry way drive. It's rather junky looking compared to City bldgs Zeroscaping and native plants could be used to save water

The police Dept. was very helpful in securing my new home while it was under construction

The police are always friendly and helpful.

Why are we adding chemicals to our drinking water (Fluoride)?

The police were very kind when they came to our house once because our bipolar son had called them. He was unstable when coming out of UNI at the University of Utah. The police were very understanding and calmed him down.

The proposed round-about at Brighton High School will only increase traffic problems and accidents. This is a STUPID idea!

The rec Center is really looking poor to me and we pay a premium. I would love to see some upgrade for what we have to pay to use it. The pool is gross, locker rooms disgusting and cycle bikes are dysfunctional.

The rec center should be able to accept anyone who lives in city boundaries.

The recreation center has provided wonderful swimming and ice skating classes for my granddaughter.

The recreation center is poorly run, bad pool hours, poor inexpensive maintenance issues -poor management. The Guthrie skatepark is a treasure and is very popular/ crowded. Consider expanding the skatepark! Good job with idle free and goal of renewable energy for city!

The recreation center needs updating, new carpeting and a thorough cleaning

The recreation center seems to be less of a community resource than it used to be. I look forward to more trails coming online throughout the city. Improved connectivity of walking paths. Taking advantage of streets that are not yet connected but could improve mobility off of busy roadways.

The recycling program is confusing

The recycling programs are not sustainable anymore now that China is not taking many of our plastics, paper, etc. I really only need to put my recycling bin out every two to three weeks but I pay for a weekly service. I would recommend that recycling bin collection only occur every other week, allow residents to opt out if they want and not pay for the service, or eliminate individual pickup and provide recycling repositories at locations throughout the city (this is already being done for glass for example). I hate to hear that I take the time to recycle and pay for the service only to hear most of it is going to the dump anyways.

The roads and sidewalks are not well-maintained. The sidewalks in my neighborhood are awful. A street that was a dead end for many years has been pushed through for new development. We were promised speed bumps on our street but that has not happened. Play promises no follow-through

The snow removal is much better than previous years. I've had several complaints with the trash collection agency this year however the snow removal team is not very good at removing snow from the road in front of my house (REDACTED). It is in a bend in a road and they routinely miss about 50% of the road leaving my neighbors and me about 10-15 extra feet we need to plow beyond our driveway. Several times I've had to call well after the 24-48 hours post-storm.

The snowplows always push huge piles of snow into the corner of our street by our mailbox.(REDACTED)

The traffic speed situation is an ongoing frustration for those who live between REDACTED; it is an accident waiting to happen, no one had taken us seriously.

The traffic, speed limit is 25, people cut through going to and from work speeding, thank heavens for speed bump, it briefly slows them down. Then there's the snow plow that buries the sidewalk then people and kids walk in the street, I live by REDACTED. please patrol it a little more, especially around 4.30, and when Brighton gets out!

The trash roll offs should come twice a year, less often the second time.

Also better notice when they are coming

The water and sewer infrastructure is aging, residential paving is getting thick enough to make driveway entry hard on cars, most surrounding cities have remote readout on water meters. We do not.

The water quality is exceptional but the cost of it is astronomical. We have a large piece of property and the cost of keeping our yard presentable is causing us to move from the area.

The website system for contacting departments apparently is not monitored. I've sent a couple of questions with no response. A few years ago you would quickly hear from someone and many times it was the Mayor himself.

The zoning laws are a disappointment to us in the upper Cottonwood Heights area. The traffic is horrible and parking is worse because of the businesses on the Wasatch/Ft. Union intersection. Snow removal becomes impossible because of those parking for the restaurants in that area. It's extremely difficult to exit from our neighborhood onto Ft. Union during ski season during rush hours. The housing erected in the same area is deplorable. If you put in big box stores in the gravel pit area, I'm afraid that our traffic problem will only be escalated and our neighborhoods even less private than they already are.

There are 7 speed bumps on I believe, 6810 So. I think 2 speed bumps would do the job. Please remove 5.

There are many dark streets throughout the city, especially the stretch along Highland Drive between Creek Road and Bengal Blvd., in addition to our own neighborhood. As a runner it often makes me feel unsafe on the roads during the darker hours of the mornings and evenings, especially in winter. It would be great to have more walking paths throughout the city too.

There is a storm drain in front of my house and I rarely see any maintenance of it such as cleaning it out.

There should be some marketing done to encourage more residents to recycle. I also wish our city could collect glass recycling.

There's no recycling and no laws promoting xeriscape

They need to change the 25 mph speed limit going up the 3000 South hill to 35 or 40 mph. I followed 2 police cars in the last month going 40-45 mph. You can go 40 mph going north down the street, but it is 25 mph going north up the hill. How can they justify doing the speed when they have ticketed local residences for speeding!

This police department is a sham. Chief Russo should have been prosecuted years ago for various offenses. Nearly all of the officers working for him he recruited and are probably just like him. The Canyon Inn is a perfect example of government intrusion on the free market. Everything Russo, Cullimore and his people did there was unconstitutional and illegal.

Traffic is awful in the area I live REDACTED Union. keep on building up the area but no improvement in traffic control. Some new



structures (like the one that's almost on the sidewalk on Fort Union and 14th east) and the tacky lights they have at the top of the building make the area feel kind of trashy

Traffic was terrible on Fort Union during repair and it took much longer than it should have

Unfortunately CH rec spent a lot of money on the ugly "rock" formation in the pool that could have been used more wisely. Unified fire is one of the most reliable departments out there and I hope CH doesn't see the need to take over this service

Used the citizen assist services of 911 and was very impressed!

Very concerned about how the city is developing. It appears that developers get to develop anything they want, for example The Givenry on Wasatch Blvd. Way too many homes, which has added more traffic and congestion on an street that is way over used or the Ivory Homes project on Creek Road. That is unsafe and to have allowed a street to come onto Creek Rd was ridiculous, or another example, is allowing homes to be built on Danish Rd. which is too narrow and too traveled to have driveways and homes on it. We need more green space and less development.

Wasatch Blvd bike lanes didn't improve. Snow removal has gotten better, but still has problems

Water bills are becoming very expensive since our water supply is from Salt Lake City. Consider obtaining our own supply or contracting with Sandy and/or Midvale. Animal control is frustrating to deal with neighbors raising chickens and many dogs running loose.

Water main leak in my neighborhood not looked at for weeks and one fix project not completed for a couple months.

Water prices are escalating at an alarming rate. What is being done to regulate this similar to utilities through the Public Service Commission?

Water rates are too high. Unnecessary construction of high dive at Cott Rec Center, unfair pricing at Cott Rec Center: non-residents get a lower rate than residents to use the facilities (factoring in the tax increase levied to all residents this year).

Way more police than we need, causing more problems than they are solving. Could do better with snow removal. Still want a dog park.

We always have terrible snow removal in and around our neighborhood. Several times, when the plow does come through he blocks all of our driveways. When we lived in West Jordan they provided a green waste can that was fantastic. I really wish Cottonwood Heights would offer that at a reasonable price. Cottonwood Heights Rec Center is an amazing facility but their scheduling with the pool during the summer is erratic. They seem to favor swim meets over serving the community. Also, compared to neighboring rec centers, it doesn't offer nearly as much in way of kids sports and programming.

We always have trouble with snow removal and they seem to tear up the gutters and parking strips.

Sometimes they should not even be out when there is no snow.

We are happy with the leaf bags and disposal services. We are very happy with having the rec center nearby. Our only complaint is the poor snow removal and the concern about the expansion of Wasatch Blvd. which we do not want.

We are on a small street and sometimes it is quite some time before they get to us. That being said I realize when it snows on us it snows on the whole city and clearing it takes time

We had a small fire at our home and the fire department came very quickly and were very professional and checked everything out before leaving. We think UFA has done a great job and we have loved interacting with Mike Watson and the other firefighters. We hope the city continues this relationship.

We had been talking to our former mayor about a dog park for years and the answer always was, We are working on it. Now it is time for action!

My cousin was visiting from NY and was horrified at the lack of night lighting on the streets

We have had to call several times on neighbor dogs they have 4. The officer came out and told the people that they were ok with the dogs because they were small dogs and the same breed. They do not clean up there yard from the dog poop, rats are all over the place because there yard is a mess.

There is not enforcement of the way the yards look, cars all over the street. No rules followed.

We have several houses in my area that are abandoned, burned out and a horrible mess, nothing EVER gets done about them, yards are a mess, sidewalks don't get shoveled, etc... There don't seem to be laws about what the city should look like. Trees should be planted, people should have to water and take care of their homes. Garbage (diapers in the gutters, take out wraps and debris, food thrown, broken glass) is everywhere in the streets and in the parks. This city seems to care about businesses only, we aren't a beautiful city, it's one big strip mall. If you bring up messy, unkept yards, you are told to turn the other cheek. Our out of town visitors always remark about the differences in the houses in our neighborhood, how badly some are and nice others are. There is alot of emphasis and money on



Butlerville Days and it all ties into the local faith. Successful businesses have been run out of business due to the local faith and greed for profit and land (Canyon Inn), excessive ticketing from police at the 7-11 on Ft. Union, Porcupine, etc... it seems there is little pride in this city, how it looks, where money is spent and what is important. Truth and honesty is important to me, we did not have that from Cullimore. Every year, I email about snow plowing, esp the intersection that forms an icepond because they don't put the blade down and clear out the snow and ice. If we have laws for parking on snowy streets, home upkeep and the like, why are they not enforced? We are reprimanded for dogs off leash at BMS, but no one is reprimanded for abandoning their house, letting it fill up with rats that all of us fight with or yards full of dangerous junk, parking on the street so plows can't clean effectively or walks not shoveled and on and on. It is very disheartening to see, which I do as I walk twice a day.

We have several neighbors that leave dogs out early am and late night that bark uncontrolled. Some type info on how to deal with that would be nice to see in the normal publications

We just got back from the area where we lived before (not in Utah) and were reminded of their leaf pick-up program. They have a truck that goes by twice in the fall and vacuums up all the leaves that are piled in the streets at the curbs. They mulch the leaves, and citizens are able to pick up the mulch in the spring. I think it would be great to have that type of program in our city!

We keep being promised that an off-leash dog park is being "looked-into" without anything being done. We have thousands of dog-owners in CH, but our needs continue to be ignored.

We live across the street from where the rec center supports membership. We would like to be eligible for membership. Thank you!

We live at REDACTED and do not have any form of recycling. We aren't sure if that's up to the city or the apartment community management, but we would really like to get some recycling services.

We live facing north, so our front yard and street are colder and the snow stays around longer. It seems that the snow removal trucks always leave the most snow in the widest band of snow, up to a full car width, on the north facing side, and clear the south facing side much closer to the curb. Because of this, the snow can go for a month not melting on the north side, while the south side melts nicely when we have sunny days. I've never understood this. It makes the street narrower and narrower during snowy months. I'm grateful for any snow removal, but this one point is annoying. I love living in Cottonwood Heights. Whenever anyone finds out where I live they often comment that they wish they could find a home in the area. It is very desirable. I feel fortunate to live here.

We live in Cottonwood Heights and pay taxes to Cottonwood Heights, but we can not join Cottonwood Heights Recreation Center at local rate because we one block to far North

We live on Creek Rd just below 3500 East. Many drivers exceed the speed limit in this area.

Extra police patrols would be a huge help! I have never witnessed a patrol in this area and drivers seem to know this.

Maybe consider speed bumps?

We live on a cul-de-sac. Often it will be a day or two after a major snow storm before the street is plowed. Some sidewalks in our area need attention as tree roots have lifted them creating a danger for walking.

We love the community plays.

We love the recreation opportunities provided by the rec center and see it as a great value

We missed having the annual cleanup dumpsters in our neighborhood this year. Was this service not available?

We moved to Cottonwood Heights a year ago, and I have been impressed so far. Quick snow removal, quick response with the canal near us was overflowing, I can recycle multiple items. Easy walk to multiple services. I do wish there were sidewalks in my neighborhood, but it is older so I understand that.

We moved to Cottonwood Heights two years ago from Sandy. We love Cottonwood Heights and couldn't be happier. Especially compared to downtown Salt Lake City, with its homeless crisis.

We need bulk cleanup twice a year. Spring and fall. Like Sandy does.

We need glass recycling curbside

We need more recycling. I would be willing to subsidize curbside glass pickup to boost start that. Please advocate for and provide more recycling services.

We need more street lights, particularly in areas where there are no sidewalks. Also, please please please shovel the snow on the sidewalks on the south side of Fort Union, especially east of 3000 east. People have to walk their dogs and walk to school.

We need something less than a ladder truck for the majority of the city. We need to attract innovative recycling businesses. I'd like to see laws and practices to retain rainwater. Pipes on Brookhill and neighboring streets seem to be old.





We need to be more effective in solving the challenges with basement apartments in homes. We need more affordable housing. We also need clarity and either enforcement or decision to clearly allow these units in neighborhoods.

We need to expand recycling to cover more widely used items that can be put back into the system!

We need yard waste pick up curbside (without paying for an extra can) 2-3/ week during fall when leaves are dropping. West Valley City provides extra solid waste removal curbside several times a month. Even if they would pick up bagged leaves or other items.

We were not notified before the bulk trash pick up.

We wish you would/could do more to enforce keeping weeds down in residential yards. It seem that most neighborhoods have several homes which are not maintained and have lots of weeds much taller than 6".

We wished we were in the recreation center area, we would use it more if it extended to our part of the Top of The World neighborhood, but instead it stops a few blocks away.

We would like at least one street light on the street I live on. Better response from police. More green space. Cost of the rec center for residents

We would love for power poles to be buried.

We're on a main residential street (REDACTED) yet snow removal often removes snow from only 50% of the road, leaving way too much snow on the sides. Also, snow removal on less important residential streets is much worse!

We've had a multitude of unsafe wild animals in our yard. When called, the city told us we were on our own in dealing with them.

Went to a council planing meeting and the decision was already made prior to our attendance. That was a joke. It was about the shoe box housing for Fort Union Blvd. Also the chair person gave us all appropriate directions as to how to handle ourselves verbally in the meeting. But once we could no longer speak up, three members of the council were demeaning and rude in how they responded to us. One individual specifically when laughing at the group as to our fear about increased traffic when the sign was put up in front of Ridgecrest Elementary school. That was never one of the issues in that meeting. The issues, were the cost factors, the foliage that would prevent the sign being seen by those driving East bound on 7200 South, and that fact a huge number of parents would never see the sign since their children are bused in. Also the brightness at night of the sign. No one brought up increase traffic util this council member used it as a shut down method of the conversation.

What happened to the leaves trailers we used to have at cottonwood park.

What is the point in recycling if we can actually recycle recyclable materials?! Find a recycling place that can handle all recyclables because, within the current regulations of what can be put in our recycle bin, we just end up generating more garbage.

When we have a large rain storm, we only have one drain on our street and it quickly gets blocked up with street debris and a large puddle occurs. I have walked down and unblocked it several times but it seems that there is no one working for the city that is responsible for this.

Where is snow removal? Has gone way downhill. Serious problem.

Whether we do or don't end up approving ADU's, please start enforcing city regulations on cars being parked in our residential streets for longer than allowed. Code enforcement won't do anything about it unless they're blocking the street.

Why do we have water from SLC Water? I thought there were laws about cities selling services outside of their boundaries.

Why do we spend more and more on making "Butlerville Days" bigger and longer when it costs taxpayer money? Make it self-sustaining.

Why do we not enforce ordinances, such as snow removal from sidewalks, no dogs in park, running red lights, etc.? If you enforced ordinances with fines, you could probably have enough money to decrease or eliminate our taxes altogether. And the city would be a safer place to live.

You keep raising taxes - municipal energy, sales tax (against will of citizens), and property tax (against will of citizens) - and you offer us nothing more for it.

Will you please the repair the edge of the wall on the north side of REDACTED.? The top corner needs some attention before it gets worse. Thanks.

With all the information about recycling, but it is still confusing

Would like see more time given to pool access by the Rec center during the day. It seems that schools have the pool locked up for their use and at times the pool goes unused.

Would like to see glass recycling and would like more visibility of police officers throughout the city.

Would like to see the builders & contractors fix roads they damage in a good way not just patch up & leave them a mess. Parks need to



be better maintained & STOP wasting water. You do not maintain the water system & water goes all over everywhere.

Yes, we live on a cul-de-sac (40+ years) and are always one of the last to get snow removal. It is very frustrating not to have the snow removed and to get stuck in the circle on a heavy snow storm. I always have to call a few times a year to beg someone to come and remove the snow.

You have a tough job. We appreciate it when you listen to the citizens of CWH. And not just to the loud and pushy ones. I am concerned about keeping CH family friendly and a safe place to live. I wish there were some way to just encourage people to not let their neighborhoods look rundown. Whether that means we need to do a better job as neighbors to step up and help those who are unable to care for their property, or to have some kind of enforceable code to get those who can and just won't, keep their property at least semi decent. I think that is a problem. Also the congestion on Wasatch and 70th S on powder days is really getting out of hand. Tough issues.

Zoning and building construction was very good to work with

Zoning the city of Cottonwood Heights was so unfair and unreasonable regarding zoning with people with disabilities. What kind of city does Cottonwood Heights want to be?? Uncaring?

all devices are as expected

allowing residential building on properties that were designated as earthquake zones on Sutton Way. A particular lot was never supposed to be built upon and yet was granted a permit to do so. Also, infringement on code requirements for property setbacks and retaining walls to prevent soil erosion onto adjacent properties.

bathrooms at the rec center need an overhaul. kind of gross

better definition and coordination on recycling...maybe a mulch program

better recycling!

bravo to CHPD

city spending is out of control & has been since the city began. the city is now zoning to grow the tax base instead of maintaining the bedroom community that most of us moved into. fiscal responsibility has long flew out the window.

code enforcement for businesses is just as important as houses.

feel the response and integrity of our law enforcement officers is exemplary although they do not seem to be supported in the way I would like to see from our commissioners! I would like to live in the city in the Salt Lake valley that would be reputed to be the safest due to having the most well staffed, and most well equipped police department. One that is respected by the city council and the citizens, and is supported financially to make it so regardless of the increased tax need to make it so!!!

fix the roads...and quit raising our taxes

garbage collects have broken our garbage cans 3 different times. they seem to just drop instead of putting down

great police department and emergency prep.

had a burglary case, the police response was nearly negligent. I didn't get the case even filed until 3 days later, no communication of expectations, and it was a hot case that I found hot leads to. It was a case of low-hanging fruit but very poor initial response. I did 90% of the detective work myself and we barely caught him in time before the leads went dry.

the snow removal process has definitely gotten worse in our neighborhood since CH took over. We need better planning and execution of this critical service

there are some crooked cops in CHPD

there is a stretch of sidewalk in the park beside the wasatch fire station that is actually the wasatch blvd sidewalk and should be maintained in the winter and is not. Those of us who walk have no sidewalk as we pass the park because of this.

they dont" remove snow on time.they leave snow pile on the drive way,it hard shaweled snow speashley for older people.

very disappointed with the police force, not friendly and not consistant.

we appreciate the police dept. overall performance since replacing the unified dept. Keep up the good work!

we are the only street address on our particular block. Due to the way our house faces I suppose. We often get missed by snow removal, street cleaning, and pot hold street maintenance.

we have had a theft from our property this year with very little follow up from the police



we have some homes/yards that are eyesores. Barking dogs continue to be problems.

- A terrible situation-garbage piles harboring rats, dog barking and stink, gofer infestation- in a yard in our neighborhood was dealt with once again, but it hasn't lasted in the past. I feel like ordinance enforcement needs to have authority to sustain compliance.
- All positive and quick responses
- Always friendly and helpful
- Animal Control, Officer Lovato
- Animal control & the Police Dept. are pretty great to deal with.
- Appreciate the staff with police dept
- Both Officer Lovato and Chief Russo were very helpful.
- Butlerville days being moved from 24th of July very unhappy
- CHPD was responsive, timely and efficient. PLEASE QUIT TALKING ABOUT GOING BACK TO UPD!!!
- CWH police are nice, friendly, and do their jobs. Fire do their jobs also when it isn't July 24th.
- Called to inquire about terminal road projects, and was given another phone number to lady who handled all the complaints. Left a message, then called 2 more times, and finally got her, and her response was simply once Cottonwood Heights contracts road work out, they have little from that point on, unless it runs over budget and is late...which it was, but still she could do nothing at that point.
- City Council seems adversarial to citizens demand for maintaining low density of R1 zoning.
- City officers should know the codes in which they are paid to enforce ( not their opinion code )
- Code ENFORCEMENT and the Mayor's office have been contacted by myself and several others with them turning their backs and refusing to deal with the community's problems, which is a shame

Have tried to get the city to fix intersection of REDACTED. It is always full of water with a deep ditch. Always told that their are more important projects that need to be done. The city keeps bandaiding the ditch which is a waste of money. Do it right!

---

High school students speeding to from school lack of speed enforcement ongoing issue being ignored. Political pressure from parents.

---

I am a contractor and do most of my business in Cottonwood Heights as I live here. I like to work close to home and deal with the building department quite often. From time to time deal with the Building Department quite often. from time to time I have issues with the permit process

---

I am very happy with the wonderful police force we have. They are nice people to have protecting us and our properties. Always friendly and willing to listen. I wave to them every time I see them!

---

I asked the office to be proactive about an issue here in Cottonwood Heights. I received a response, but there has been no follow through.

---

I called about the sewer man hold stinking. They immediately came and cleaned it out and sealed it. I also had to call about extensive pot holes on our street. The crew came and fixed it in a timely manner.

---

I called to ask about painting lines for our intersection to help with highland drive traffic. Nothing was done

---

I complained about CHPD and was dismissed by the chief of police

---

I contacted my district representative via phone message and email to ask about water conservation programs - he never returned my calls

---

I contacted the City Manager about chronic long-term commercial vacancies and asked it would consider new taxes on property owners who leave their commercial properties vacant for >1 year to encourage them to find tenants or sell their property to someone who will. The response was patronizing and the buck was passed to the county.

---

I contacted the city about addressing a traffic light that had either no sensor or a broken sensor so you would sit at a red light for minutes on end. I do not know if it was addressed; regardless, I received no response. Poor communication or acknowledgement of concerns

---

I contacted the police about people speeding on our street which is a general complaint among neighbors. The officer said I would have to call him to come out and watch it or gather my neighbors for a meeting to get a speed bump on our street. I know I am not the only neighbor to have complained about this and I wish the city could do more without us being so involved.

---

I don NOT feel safe in my community nor do I feel that it is of any concern to CHPD

---

I emailed the city regarding street light twice with no response

---

I expressed my concerns above (zoning and variance requests which are seemingly rubber-stamped).

---

I had a very good experience dealing with the Cottonwood Heights Rec Center people this week. Thanks to Erica!

---

I had a young kid ring my doorbell and run. I gave the police department the video of the kid who had a very distinct haircut. Their response was to buy a \$70 camera from Walmart. All they had to do was take the video to the high school and see if they would recognize the kid. The doorbell ringing went on for weeks and usually at night. I could identify the pickup etc and the Police didn't even care

---

I had to talk to someone in zoning. I have a corner lot and would like to wrap around my back deck to the side, but the zoning calls for a 20 foot open space from my house to the side walk. Seems excessive. I called to clarify that.

---

I have a neighbor that rents out their garage and has too many people living there and too many cars parked on the street. We do not have any sidewalks and it makes it difficult for cars driving up and down the road. At most they have 10-12 cars parked at their house, they start parking in front of our homes and we are TIRED of it. I think there is some 'dealing' going on there too since they have short and frequent 'visitors' there. It's been like this since I moved into my home in 2007. I've called the cops several times because of their 'visitors' parking right in front of my driveway, loud parties, fights out front. Neighbors (me included) have started leaving our garbage cans out front of our homes to block them from using our homes for parking. This is on REDACTED in case you are interested.



I have an abusive neighbor who came on my property to harass me and the cop told me that even if I had a restraining order, they probably wouldn't enforce it.

I have asked more than once to address traffic light problem and it still exists. How hard is it to increase turn arrow timers and add turn arrow lights to signals that do not give turn arrows?

I have full confidence in the Cottonwood Heights policy although I know it may cause budgetary concerns. I am grateful they have time for code enforcement etc.

I know it is a tough job regarding fireworks, but it is out of control, and I think so overwhelming to the Police that they probably give up. I would like stronger laws completely outlawing them. When people have to buy drugs to calm their pets it's time the noisemaking crowd take their party noises somewhere else.va

I love our city and I think that everyone is doing their best to improve whatever is needed. I wouldn't want to live in any other place. Cottonwood Heights is my home. The police, the Fire Dept, the city employees are all wonderful and they feel like family

I made a request of the building inspection department that went totally unanswered. Very very dissatisfied with their attitude towards addressing my problem

I think I've made it pretty clear and most of my statements

I think that Cottonwood Heights is selling out to developer and it's hurting our city

I tried to find a muni code regarding a neighbor that has parked their 30-foot, tarp-covered RV in their driveway to the chagrin on neighbors. They have plenty of driveway in their back yard but insist on parking it out front. There really should be a law against this.

I was very pleased with the personal interaction and information I received from the police office in the city office building. The young woman helped me to know how I could access service to check on citizens in the community who appear to have mental illness who are on the sidewalks of the city and perhaps need help in getting to a safe place.

I wish there was more enforcement of single family dwellings in our area, alot of rentals with ALOT of people living in one single family dwellings that are NOT the home owners.which causes traffic, parking issues, not taking care of the yard and make the value of my home go downward. this really needs to be addresses.

I would like better code enforcement in regards to homes and yards not being maintained. Too many dogs that bark non stop.

Incompetence, unethical, illegal business practices have been the standard at the C.H. offices.

Issue with commercial vehicle parked for long period of time.

It is difficult to trust. It seems the agenda comes from one specific group.

It is to hard to reach someone for help.

It was not the City's fault that I was disappointed. I was turning left onto Wasatch Boulevard going north from La Caille and I needed to enter Golden Hills Avenue to go to my home. The traffic from Little Cottonwood Canyon was traveling super fast and no one would let me in to make a right hand turn. I was blocked from accessing the street. The speed limit needs to be reduce and the light needs to be returned to the intersection to stop the speeding traffic. I went to Cottonwood Heights to make a complaint and I was told I needed to call the State. I tried calling the person and I never received a call back. The State should have someone embedded in the City Hall to address these concerns. I understand there were public hearings on this issue, but I did not see the notice in the paper until the hearings were over. The city should have given notice to the residents east of Wasatch a separate flyer in the mail to notify them of this hearing. The notice in the paper was not sufficient. The paper is usually filled with "feel good" articles about kids in school or an award someone is getting, so it is not high on the priority list. This was a topic that was important and notice was inadequate.

It's a tedious and onerous process

Lack of input over new roundabout by City Hall and Brighton High School. Terrible response time when reporting attack at skate park.

Last winter I was walking along 30th east and a section of the sidewalk was buckled. I tried to call the city after hours and I had a terrible time trying to find someone to notify about this. I think I finally just called Mike P. since I was able to get through to his voice mail. I am not sure if he ever got the message because the sidewalk is still a menace. I is on the other side of the street from the quilt shop in case anyone wants to take a look. Overall my experiences with the City have been fine.

Last winter a snow plow knocked a tree over in my park strip. I left a message never got a call back. Tree was cleaned up by a crew all that was left was a note saying it was my fault.

No one called me back despite 20+ phone calls and multiple phone messages. The city controls the path behind our home and we have had issues with spring water and runoff that floods our backyard. I literally couldn't get anyone to answer me, even just to tell me they wouldn't do anything.

Snow removal continues to be an issue, and complaints and suggestions aren't taken seriously. Loss of multiple workdays and paid-in-advance childcare for our family due to impassable roads is unacceptable.

Sometimes codes etc really need to be looked at on a case by case basis. One size does not fit all. Remember you are there to serve individuals as well as large and vocal groups

Speed along the aforementioned Wasatch Bl

Support the CHPD 100% - Have always found city and staff to be very supportive

The CH Rec Center is very responsive to provide service.

The City seems very prompt and polite in the initial response but then the issue still sits dormant.

The Police Officer was accommodating, but the office staff was not and didn't share the same info as the police officer.

The cement from the street to my driveway is sinking; I called the city offices, left the person in charge a voicemail. Never ever received a response - poor service

The city needs to work better with homeowners, school district officials re: appearance and maintenance of properties.

The increase in property taxes. We attended the meeting. We are sick that every single time there is money wanted for something, the answer is always raise taxes. Find a way to cut before you price us out of our house!!!

The officers were very accommodating

The one time I called, I felt I was not taken seriously or that my opinion didn't matter. It took about a month and a call to a councilman to get some action

The police are not dog catchers. Why defer animal enforcement to them unless you are incompetent or lazy?

The police officers seem to pay just a little too much attention to me & because I was profiled and got a metabolite dui that when I do decide to pay thousands to get my license back that the officers will harass me, pull me over & try to catch me slipping. I don't and probably won't get my license back just cuz of that reason

The police response is rather slow and normally not effective

The police speed traps. They hand out tickets like candy and then fix the problem afterwards. They set up in poor lit areas or non-visible areas and then fix later with street paint, signs, and lights after the fact. After hitting you with a \$250 ticket. I think the tickets pay for the improvements.

The police were very kind and understanding

The proposed round about is a joke. We had no input. We all know the decision was already made. Injuries just waiting to happen. Why not just build an insta care right there to handle all the future business

The receptionists are rude and unknowledgeable. Departments are slow to respond.



The removal of vehicles in the streets MUST be stopped. We have a family of 6, & a parking spot for 2 vehicles. When I leave work on a Friday evening. & do not return for work until Monday. & it happens to snow over the weekend. Your going to tow me because its my day off from very very physically demanding job?????

The repair on Creek Road where it meets Deer Creek on the south side was excellent. There were some other small repairs that should have been done at the same time to reduce the need for a return visit. Where DeerCreek meets Danish Way, there are some small pot holes that will likely become major this winter.

The staff I consulted were very helpful and provided the information I was seeking, including following up with me to make sure I had what I needed to make a decision.

The staff are courteous and quickly follow up.

They are very unhelpful.

They did their best to reduce the trash in the Cemetery with the tree cuttings.

They do not enforce the code as far as short term rentals etc. Not taken serious.

They have helped in a good manner

They need a stronger enforcement of people keeping their lawns mowed and clean from weeds

Ticket capital of Utah

To much building, traffic has gotten horrible but they keep building. The noise from Wasatch is 24/7

Treat people equally. Don't harass one and let the next slide.

Very concerned about teen vaping at high schools

Very disappointed with: 1. Accommodations made to housing & apt developers 2. Lack of leadership by city council RE poor transit, halting Wasatch Blvd expansion 2. Lack of sharing of information related to the "greener" ordinances that have been past. No idling has not been communicated effectively to drivers dropping off/picking up school kids, fast food/banks and all drive throughs are not communicating no idling effecitively, PD is not enforcing.

Very responsive

Very uncaring and unflexible for people with disabilities.

We and our neighbors tried to report water main breaks and had a lot of issues finding who we needed to talk to. Even called the police to look at it. After four tries to different departments or dead end phone calls we finally were able to get a hold of someone to address the second leak nearby (the first complaint for a bigger leak took a few days for someone to address and that project is still I completed a couple months later)

We are over funding the police department

We called to complain about a Vivint salesman who came to our door at 10:15 PM. The lady who helped us at the general line was very helpful in first, validating our complaint, and then directing us to the police to file a report. I haven't had any follow up, however, which would be nice... to know if they contacted Vivint and if the salesman was cited.

We can afford new city buildings but services suffer?

We had a water leak in the street and it was handled well but the repairs took too long.

We had an issue and the police showed up faster than expected

We have called the police regarding problems at Crestwood Park and they have responded well to our calls.

We spoke about weeds on a neighbors and nothing changed

When contacting any specific department I have been dealt with in a very professional manner.

When the City Mayor, rep 4 Christine, and John Thomas of UDOT said at the City Council meeting on July 2d that that if the residents then gathered accepted the proposed Wasatch Blvd plan, UDOT and the City had agreed to wo together

Thanks for the opportunity to express my feelings and hopes for this great community to continue to grow and improve.

Thanks for this great survey.

The Brighton High Roundabout demonstrates either the incompetence, stupidity, or corruption of the City Council.

The Fort Union/Highland Drive intersection needs to be fixed to eliminate the bottleneck created on Highland Drive by Starbucks (add a lane where it goes to two going north on Highland). Don't waste money putting in a round about by City Hall. Use the money for storm drains or to fix roads or to improve snow removal services or buy open space. Road improvement services need to be better, use Holladay as a role model. Spreading squiggly tar all over the road seems to be a short term fix that is messy, ugly and not the kind of service we used to receive from Salt Lake County.

The acrimony toward CHPD by certain council women is unacceptable and needs to stop.

The budget portion could use improvement

The city is headed in the right direction ... but I can't stress this enough that it needs to get competitive with attracting the younger generation to move here. This means it needs to have affordable housing and walkable community businesses.

The crime and theft in this area is alarming and would like to see changes made to increase awareness and public safety. ALSO think that all sex offenders should be known in area

The estimated time to take the survey more than 15 minutes. It is not appropriate to ask for that much time for a survey without adequately preparing the person taking the survey.

The first few questions should've been more specific to what or what we do not approve of. There needed to be context and a verbal feedback section

The growth of the city needs to slow down. The taxes are to high

The lack of inquiry on reasons (aside from the dog park question) for support or opposition to policy questions will limit the utility of these results. One could oppose something because the measure doesn't go far enough, or a preference for a different approach to the same goal, rather than out of opposition to the idea on principle.

The last time I took a poll for Cottonwood Heights I didn't feel the information gathered was adequately communicated or acted upon. Thank you.

The letter I received the Survey information on seemed very suspicious - lots of red flags when it comes to phishing, spam, etc.

The needed time for the survey was estimated at 15 minutes for most, it was easily more than double that estimate.

The ordinance control officer can be too aggressive (I must admit - I've had very limited experience with them). Maybe some people like that. I haven't had many interactions with them, but I feel like I was treated rudely in an exchange which happened several years ago with my dogs. I'm sure they are busy, and they fulfill an important role, but sometimes I get the feeling they just want to bust you. There was another time, and I don't know who was responsible for this, but I had a trailer towed from the side of my house. OK, so a neighbor probably didn't like it there, and I'm a little peeved that they didn't come to me and say "move it", but they must have called the town, which then called a removal service. No attempt was made to contact us, no note left, all of a sudden it was gone. I assumed it was stolen and called police, they said check the impound yard, and I did. Cost \$500 to get it back, and it had only been gone a short period,



like maybe a couple days. Again, this was several years ago. I have not had an interaction with ordinance enforcement in at least 4 years, so this is old news.

The questions in this poll were poorly constructed and did not allow participants to give pertinent input. City Council is not following the 2005 or 2015 general or Ft Union plans. Wasatch Blvd & Ft Union transit planning should be current focus of city council as they work w UTA & UDOT to achieve long term "people moving" NOT roads for cars. Questions about effectiveness of PD focused only on major crime when citizens want enforcement of No Idling, slow speeds. Utility poles, commercial signs, strip malls, commuting car noise blights all artery roads. Parents are afraid to let children walk/bicycle for transportation because of inconsistent levels of pedestrian and bicycling safety on our main roads.

The questions where you have to compare two opposites should be actual opposites. Streets being quiet vs streets being congested are two different things in my opinion... Otherwise, I am glad for the opportunity to provide my feedback even though I know this is just fulfilling the public outreach requirement to increase the new storm water fee required by the state. As an engineer, I wholeheartedly support this and understand. Thank you.

The road work this summer was really poorly planned. There were cones in a lot of places for many months with no work being done.

AND on any given day, you can drive around the city and see CH vehicles parked and apparently idle. Employees not busy enough?
