City Efforts in 2023

The statements in this article are the author's views and not necessarily of the entire city council.

At the end of each year, I work with city staff to prepare a report for the city that highlights efforts and accomplishments from the previous year that I submit

to the city council. As I have communicated in previous newsletter articles, I think it is important to inform residents of some of the important efforts that occurred this past year. The following highlights are some of the items from the year-end report:

- **City Promotional Video:** We updated and finalized a video promoting Cottonwood Heights that features community residents, business leaders and Post Malone (<https://youtube/>

YLImPvfH7hA?si=Il2PTLBgtHcc34N3).

- **Hillside Plaza Acquisition, Visioning and Future Redevelopment:** The city redevelopment agency purchased the Hillside Plaza shopping center located on the corner of Ft Union Blvd. and 2300 East. An advisory committee has been established to assist in developing a vision for the site and the property will likely be redeveloped as a future town center for the community.
- **Sensitive Lands Evaluation and Development Standards (SLEDS) Update:** The City Council adopted an updated SLEDS ordinance through an intensive resident and property owner input process.
- **Park Developments:** Construction of the new Ferguson Park and trailhead parking area was completed and includes an off-leash dog area for the community. The city has also purchased

property for a future park near Doverhill Drive.

- **Utah Chiefs of Police Accreditation:** The Cottonwood Heights Police Department policies, practices, and customs were submitted to be evaluated by the Utah Chiefs of Police Association for accreditation after three years of preparation.
- **Traffic Safety:** The city council budgeted funding for the Cottonwood Heights Police department to establish a dedicated traffic unit consisting of four full-time officers focusing on enforcement to decrease traffic-related incidents and citizen complaints. This initiative aims to enhance the safety of all modes of transportation.
- **Street and Management Plan:** This past year the Public Works department implemented year five of the pavement management plan and applied 1,972,386 square feet of slurry seal improvements and finished enhancements on Danish Road, 3000 East, and Hollow Mill Drive.
- **Spring Flood Mitigation:** Due to an unprecedented amount of snowfall along the Wasatch Front that created a heightened risk of flooding along Big and Little Cottonwood Creeks, Cottonwood Heights Emergency Management and Public Works staff collaborated closely with residents to fill and deploy sandbags. Daily inspections of streams occurred to remove debris in waterways in addition to hauling away materials cleaned by residents. Although stream flows remained manageable, the city remained prepared to address any potential issues arising from the

snow melt.

- **Event Efforts:** We planned and organized Butlerville Days events, including a car show, painting class, chalk art contest, bingo, drone show, stage entertainment, vendors, and inflatables. Patrons said it was one of the best Butlerville Days and had a fun, community feeling. Also, we had a very successful and well-attended Community Block Party, Trunk or Treat, Easter Egg Hunt, and Monster Mash events.
- **Financial awards:** We obtained national recognition by receiving the Distinguished

Budget Presentation Award and the Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting. We also received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.

I am grateful for the leadership, time, and efforts our mayor and city council provide for the city. I am also grateful for all of our employees and their efforts and dedication in striving to provide effective and efficient customer service and bettering the community of Cottonwood Heights. We will always strive for continuous improvement, and I am grateful to be part of this great city. ■

Winter fire hydrant

Maintaining a clear and workable space around fire hydrants during the winter months is critical. In general, this responsibility falls on the residents who own or occupy property nearest

a hydrant.

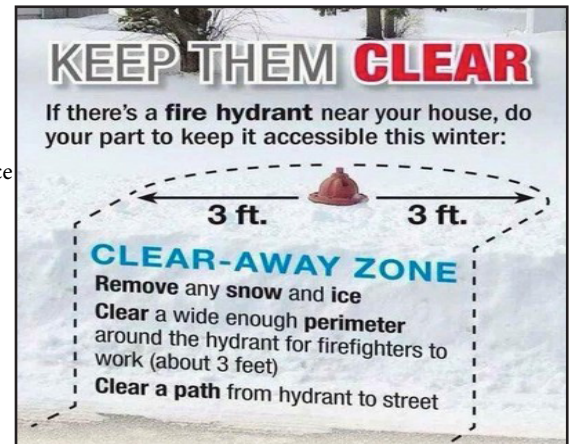
Snow accumulation can quickly obstruct fire hydrants and block access from fire department vehicles. We all think about shoveling our driveways and front steps, and making sure there is a clear means of escape during and after a snowstorm is very important, too! However, we can't neglect our responsibility to ensure the fire department has the necessary access to water supply should they need to respond to a fire.

When responding to structure fires, time is of the essence. This short clip demonstrates the

difference snow near a hydrant can have on time. If you have a hydrant on or near your property, here are the things you can do to ensure firefighters can connect to the hydrant when needed:

- Shovel or snow blow three feet of space on each side and in the back of fire hydrants.
- Maintain an open corridor from the street to the front of fire hydrants.
- These clearings should go all the way to the ground whenever possible, but not less than one foot below the hydrant caps at a minimum.

Some neighborhoods organize an Adopt-A-Hydrant program. This creates the awareness for residents to take note of clearing snow from hydrants and maintaining space around them and to help each other with those tasks throughout the winter months. These things can be done when you are already out shoveling or snow blowing



your driveways and sidewalks. Also, if you ever notice any issue that may require maintenance, please notify the city.

As always, thank you and have a safe winter! ■

Reminder: Sign up for the police department's Citizens Academy classes by Feb. 23

The Cottonwood Heights police department is holding its Citizens Academy classes again beginning Feb. 28. Citizens Academy allows Cottonwood Heights residents, business owners and employees access to CHPD officers and department resources.

Classes include:

- **Lethal force/firearm simulator:** Participants receive an introduction to the rules governing an officer's use of force, including an overview of weapons systems and how officers use them. Class members also participate in simulated real-life situations where they have to decide if or when to deploy force.
- **Valley Emergency Communications Center (VECC) tour:** Participants will tour the VECC, which provides police and fire dispatch

services for the city.

- **Criminal investigation and evidence collection:** This segment introduces participants to crime investigation and includes hands-on experience.
- **Gangs and narcotics:** Gang and narcotics enforcement investigators will provide insights on local investigations.
- **Domestic violence and K9s:** Investigators and the department's victim advocate will provide an overview of domestic violence investigations. Participants will have the opportunity to meet the department's K9 officers and their handlers.
- **Traffic enforcement:** This segment introduces participants to tactics police officers use to

enforce traffic laws and investigate violations. Officers also provide an overview of their roles in the department.

- **Less-lethal force and SWAT teams:** In this class, participants meet the department's SWAT team and learn more about their equipment. They also learn more about less-lethal weapons available to officers.

Classes begin Feb. 28 and continue each consecutive Wednesday evening until May 1st. Participants are encouraged to attend all sessions but can miss one or two sessions and still graduate from Citizens Academy.

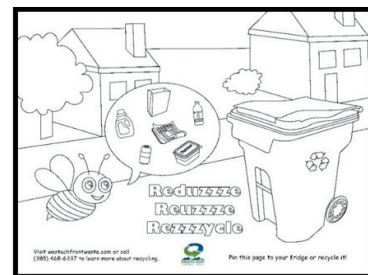

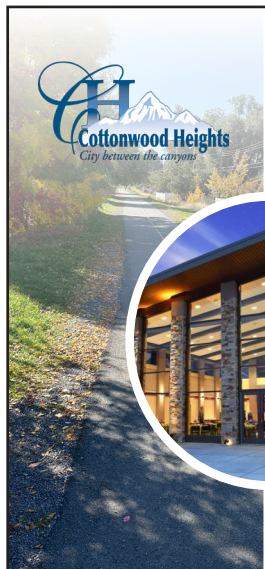

The Cottonwood Heights Historic Committee proudly accepted the Outstanding Achievement Award for their work on the digital archive from the Utah Historical Society on January 8th at the Governor's Mansion, with Governor Cox in attendance. Jennifer Ortice, Director of the Utah Historical Society, and Vice Chair of the Board of State History Spencer Hall presented the award to the Historic Committee.

The countless hours that the Historic Committee has devoted to persevering the history of Cottonwood Heights merits recognition. Thanks to their hard work and unwavering commitment, both current and future residents will be able to access vital information about the community's rich past.

The committee started working on the digital archive project in 2021, they now have seven categories of historical information for public viewing.

- Community Reminiscences Collection: residents' reminiscences since 1872
- Historical Map Collection: maps dating back to 1865
- Historic Preservation Collection:

records of historic homes and buildings

- Historical Photography: images of people and places
- Oral History with Community Members and Local Leaders
- Places in Cottonwood Heights: community histories from the late 1800s
- School History and Collection: documents and photos of schools

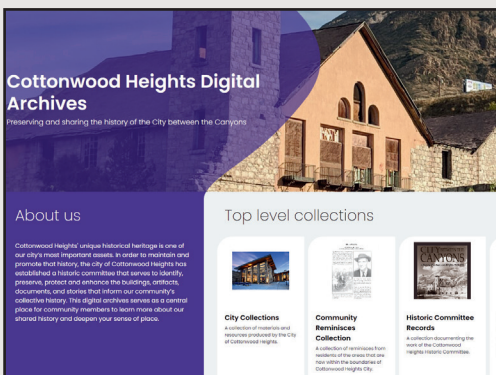

Canyon School District Adopts Free Full-Day Kindergarten District wide

In response to growing demand for full-day kindergarten, Canyons District has expanded its kindergarten offerings to give parents more choice. CSD now offers free full-day kindergarten at each of its 28 elementary schools. Participation in the full-day schedule is not required. Parents who would prefer a half-day schedule can arrange with their school to have their child do half-day instruction in a full-day kindergarten classroom. Families may choose to enroll in their neighborhood school or another convenient location by submitting a School Choice Application at canyonsdistrict.org. Full day kindergarten is a great way to give your student a head start with their learning. If there is such a thing as the Goldilocks zone of fun and learning, you'll find it Canyons District's kindergarten programs where the conditions are "just right" to get children ready for their future. Canyons Schools Dominate U.S. World & Report Rankings

Twenty-seven Canyons District elementary and middle schools topped the charts in the latest U.S. News & World Report rankings. Eight of Canyon School District's elementary schools are in Utah's top 25, according to the 2024 rankings, and three middle schools rank among Utah's top five. An earlier release of high school rankings by the magazine, showed CSD's high schools (including Brighton High) claiming five of the top dozen spots in the Salt Lake valley. The U.S. News and World Report rankings come after Niche.com, for the second consecutive year, ranked Canyons No. 1 for Best School Districts in Salt Lake County and Public School Review rated Canyons the No. 1 school district in Utah. ■

Winter Weather Sustainability

As winter weather kicks in and snow and ice accumulate, it's a good idea to assess our impact on the environment. Until the snow fully melts in the spring, it becomes increasingly contaminated with salt, litter, dirt, and other pollutants. Additionally, emissions from automobiles, wood-burning fires, and other fossil fuel-based equipment can more negatively impact air and water quality in the winter than other times of year. Here are some things we can all do to play a part in protecting health and the environment this winter:

- **Remove snow before it compacts and turns to ice.** Shovel snow onto lawns, planters, and other permeable areas so that snow melt can soak into the ground.
- **Choose your deicer wisely.** Most common deicers, such as rock salt, are useful, but can be abrasive and dangerous for kids, pets, and the environment. **Don't over-apply.** Read the packaging for directions on how much to spill. Although pricey, eco-friendly and pet-safe alternatives are better options for

the environment for home decks and yards.

- **When purchasing equipment, look for electric.** Corded and battery-powered snow blowers are now standardly available and may fit your needs. For shorter stretches, shovel or sweep the ground clear instead.
- **Minimize other emissions.** Avoid idling your car and minimize how many wood-burning fires you make this winter, or switch to electric automobile and heating options instead. Keep air quality in mind by checking your weather app or air.utah.gov.
- **Consider winter weather in new construction.** Porous asphalt and other permeable paving options help prevent ice by absorbing rainwater and snow melt. Consider snow and cold temperatures in all aspects of building design, like roofing, windows, insulation, etc. Please consult City Staff at (801) 944-7000 if you have questions on planning or building code topics.
